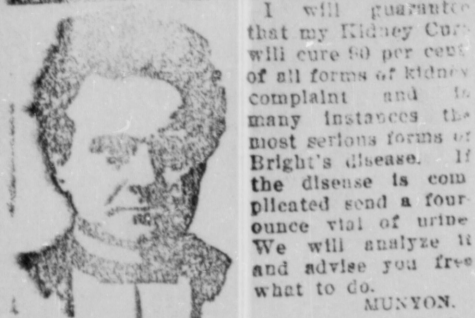

THE LEADER'S MANIFESTO.

We publish today, in another column, the election manifesto of the Honorable Daniel Gordon, Leader of the Opposition. No man in Prince Edward Island will doubt the truth of that which is set forth over Mr. Gordon's signature. In public, as in private life, Mr. Gordon is widely known as an honest man. That which he states may be relied upon; that which he promises will, if possible, be fulfilled.

As leader of the Opposition he arraigns the government party before the people of Prince Edward Island, charging them with having broken their pre-election promises and disappointed the people's expectations; and as leader of the Opposition he sets forth that which he and his party will carry out if they should be honored by the people's confidence and obtain a workable majority in the Legislature.

It was part of the government's plan when they dissolved the Legislature while yet the echoes of the Dominion contest were ringing in the air, to prevent the Opposition from submitting their policy to the people. But this has been upset by the prompt and concerted action of Mr. Gordon and his leading supporters. The policy of the Opposition is now before the people. Necessarily it is brief. But it is at the same time so clearly expressed that he who runs may read and understand.

This policy must be commended by the people; and we trust that no unworthy consideration or outside influence will deter them from electing the Leader of the Opposition and his supporters by a handsome majority.

REMEMBER.

"Elections, another opportunity has been given you to exercise your privilege as citizens.

"On the 12th of December you are called upon to give your votes for or against the Farquharson Administration.

"Remember the additional taxes that you are forced to pay since the Liberal Government came into power.

"Remember the enormous debt by which you have been overwhelmed under the Peters-Warburton-Farquharson regime.

"Remember the shameful means which the Government has had recourse to for the maintenance of power.

"Go to the polls on the 12th of December, assert your rights and vote for the Conservative candidates."—L'IMPARTIAL.

THE STOLEN BALLOT BOX.

It is pleasing to note that both the Patriot and the Guardian have been moved to demand the apprehension and punishment of the thief who stole the Greenmount ballot box.

The Patriot finds fault with THE EXAMINER for arguing that the miscreant must have been a Government supporter. But it says:

"Independent of the political course taken by that paper, THE PATRIOT, in the interests of law and order, for the maintenance of right and the protection of both electors and people, denounces the stealing of the ballot box and hopes that the disgraceful affair will be probed to the bottom, the guilt properly fixed and the perpetrators punished."

The Guardian says:

"Let the Government clear its skirts in this matter. We do not for a moment suspect that the Government or any one connected with it had any guilty knowledge of the shameful fraud that was attempted in West Prince. None the less if prompt and energetic measures are not taken to ferret out the guilty parties and bring them to justice, a suspicion may arise that such negligence is not far removed from being an accessory after the fact. We rely upon the government to do its duty in the premises. Let it not be said that ballot-boxes can be stolen and their contents plundered in Prince Edward Island, and no effort made to discover and punish the guilty."

It is anything but creditable to the government that the authorities have to be urged to do their duty in a case of this kind. The best friends of the Administration are crying out against the lackadaisical conduct of the government with reference to the apprehension and punishment of criminals.

So far, we have not heard that a single step has been taken towards the punishment of the ballot box thief—though four days has passed away!

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

THE Pan-American Exposition, opening at Buffalo, May 1st, 1901, promises to be one of the largest things of the Twentieth Century.

THE Montreal Star remarks that if all the Canadians who fought in South Africa could be brought together in Montreal and reviewed by the Duke of York when he comes, it would add to the interest of the occasion and help to strengthen Imperial sentiment.

REFERRING to the dissolution of Quebec the Montreal Gazette says: "The Government's appeal, also, is one of judgment; without evidence." This is true, also, concerning the appeal of the Farquharson Government in this province. The people are called upon to go to the polls without evidence of the state of the finances of the province—no report of the Provincial Auditor having been made up for almost a year.

In Difficulty.

HALIFAX, Nov. 22.—The wholesale grocery firm of G. A. Pyke & Son, Halifax, is in financial difficulties. A meeting of the creditors was held yesterday, at which a statement was made, showing liabilities of \$60,000. An offer of 25 cents (cash) was made and is under consideration.
