

Glac Bay Miners In 4-0 Shutout Over Sydney Millionaires

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glac Bay Miners swarmed all over Sydney Millionaires for a 4-0 win Wednesday night in a crucial game of the Maritime Major Hockey League semi-finals which Mills lead 4-2.

A win for Sydney would have put them in the final against the winner of the Halifax Atlantic-Charlottetown Islanders series which Halifax leads 4-2. The seventh game of the best-of-nine series will be played Friday in Sydney.

Miners took a 2-0 lead in the first period when they outshot Sydney 17-5, and added singles in the other two periods. Mills' goalie Norm DeFolck stopped 43 shots, while Cliff Hicks of Miners had a relatively easy night with 23.

Frank Arnett stunned Sydney with a goal within the first 31 seconds of play after taking a pass from newcomer Lyle Wiseman.

Kevlin Rochford added another late in the period.

Gordie Miller scored in the second and George Ouellet in the third. Both goals were scored within the first two minutes of play. Miners had a clear margin in the third after clearing their own in the second, outshooting Mills 14-5.

Miners' forward Johnny Lumley played in the game but Mills did not file a protest as they did in Tuesday's game. The protest was withdrawn when Sydney won.

The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association says it is trying to clarify Lumley's status, although CAHA secretary George Dudley told Sydney in a telephone conversation Wednesday that he brought Lumley was a goalie.

Lumley played with Miners earlier in the season and had served two games of a three-game suspension when he was recalled by Springfield Indians of the Quebec League.

League president C. Roy MacDonald told Miners they were not to use Lumley until the CAHA clarified his status in a telephone vote.

Maple Leafs In 3-1 Victory Over Canadiens

TORONTO, (CP)—Goalie Harry Lumley held the fort Wednesday night as Toronto Maple Leafs scored in every period for a 3-1 victory over Montreal Canadiens and climbed back into second place in the National Hockey League standings.

A crowd of 14,572—largest of the season here—saw Canadiens open the scoring early in the first period. From then on Lumley was unbeatable and his Leaf mates tied it 1-1 before the frame was over and added single counters in the second and third periods the last one into a vacant net as the desperate Canadiens tried for a tie.
