FIVE women, residents of Grafton Street, made things lively in the vicinity of the Police Station last night, by a lengthy display of their pugilistic abilities.

THE first arrival from the Upper Provinces is that of the steamer *Venicia*, which arrived from Montreal this morning. She has as freight 1,250 barrels of flour, 21 packages of dry goods, 72 packages of ship-chandlery, 100 kegs nails, and sundry other merchandize.

THE STEAMERS *St. Lawrence* and *Princess of Wales* made their first trips of the season to Picton on the 30th April and 1st May respectively. As soon as the ice permits they will begin their regular trips to the different ports as last season. Both these boats look well, and are in first-class order for the summer's work. THERE was a very fair market to-day, and sales were very lively. Prices as follows: Beef, small, from 8 to 15 cents; do., by the quarter, from 6 to 10 cents; mutton, from 8 to 14 cents; lamb, per quarter, 75 to 85 cents; pork, by the carcass, from 5 1/2 to 5 1/4 cts.; butter, fresh, from 23 to 26 cts.; do., tub, from 19 to 22 cents; clover seed, by the lb., from 24 to 25 cents; timothy do., from \$3.50 to \$4.25; potatoes, per bush., from 23 to 25 cents; oats, from 41 to 43 cents; eggs, from 8 to 10.

SOME unfeeling brute has sent to this office a bogus marriage notice which was published in yesterday morning's paper. The notice was sent by mail accompanied by fifty cents—the usual charge—and a letter to which the forged name of the gentleman said to have been married was attached. The letter is written by an experienced penman. Both the notice and the letter are on exhibition in the office, and we hope that persons from the part of the country in which they were written will call and examine them, so that the cowardly sneak who wrote them may be brought to justice. We promise, if we find out the name of the miserable hound who would be guilty of so mean and utterly contemptible a fraud, that we will let the people of Hope River know the name of one scoundrel in that vicinity.—Patriot.

BETWEEN six and seven o'clock on Monday morning, the men in Hayes's box factory and saw mill at Halifax, started the machinery. A belt for driving one of the circular saws was detached from the wheel, and a workman from the upper flat called out to Charles McGowan, who was on the flat below, to put on the belt. McGowan, who is left handed, proceeded to do so, using his left hand for the purpose. He had his coat on at the time, and it appears that the cuff caught in the protruding key of the wheel. In an instant McGowan was drawn over by the revolving shaft—his arm was broken off close up to the shoulder, and went revolving round with the shaft, while his body, from which the clothing had been entirely stripped, was thrown across the mill, a distance of about a rod. The Visiting Surgeon was soon in attendance, and aided by the House Surgeon, amputated the remainder of the severed limb. McGowan bore his sufferings with remarkable fortitude, but the shock was too great even for his iron constitution, and at five o'clock yesterday morning he died.—Herald.

**QUEBEC ELECTIONS.**

More Favorable Reports!

Conservatives Have a Clear Majority!

**DOMINION ELECTIONS.**

Special Despatch to Daily Examiner.

MONTREAL, May 3.

The result of the election is more favorable to the Conservatives than at first anticipated.

The Conservatives have thirty-three seats and the Liberals have twenty-eight.

Chicoutimi, which election takes place on Saturday, will go for the Conservatives.

In Rimouski, Chauveau and Vallo are a tie; but it is expected that Chauveau will be declared elected.

Beauce and Bellechasse are still to hear from. Both sides claim them.

We certainly have thirty-five seats out of sixty-five in the new House.

These elections do not indicate the political feeling of the Province, as the De-Boucherville Government was unpopular even with a large number of Conservatives.

We expect the Dominion elections in six weeks, because of the result of the fight on Wednesday.

We will elect forty-five members at the General Election.

**Another Account from another Source.**

Ottawa, May 3—1.30 a. m.

Both sides claim victory. Conservatives claim 35 constituencies, and concede 30 to Jolly. Ministerialists claim 33 for Jolly, 28 Opposition, and 2 Independents, one not heard from, and 1 tie, which they count on.

MALTA, May 2.

Brigadier General Keys and Quartermaster General Adams have arrived here to arrange for the reception of the Sepoys from India.

The ironclads "Minotaur" and "Resistance" have sailed, it is supposed, for Port Said.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 2.

The *Agence Russe* says: "Intelligence continues to be received of an improved state of the *pour parler* through Germany, as an intermediary for the simultaneous withdrawal from the vicinity of Constantinople, as well as of negotiations with Austria concerning her special interests."

The principle of direct exchange of views between London and St. Petersburg, on questions interesting England, we have agreed upon.

VIENNA, May 2.

The *Tag Blatt* says that in consequence of the concentration of Russian troops near the Transylvania frontier it will become necessary for Austria to take precautions.

The question of concentrating the Austrian army in Transylvania is being seriously considered. The political correspondent states that the revival of negotiations between Russia and England, relative to Congress, is due to the invitation of the former. The negotiations will be based upon larger concessions than hitherto acceded to by Russia. A special to the political correspondent from Constantinople reports that General Tuden has resumed negotiations with Admiral Hornby in regard to the details of withdrawal. He has also resumed negotiations with the Porte for the evacuation of the ceded fortresses but as yet without result. Safvet Pasha declaring that the Russians has not carried out the San Stefano Treaty obligations.

LONDON, May 2.

Reuter's telegram from Constantinople says the Russians of late have frequently violated the boundary lines of demarcation.

Intelligence from Athens says that the insurgents in Thessaly have subsided, the British Consuls having probably told the leaders that England is resolved to defend the cause of Greece.

The *Standard's* correspondent at Constantinople asserts that the Russians are approaching Batoum, intending to attack it, if not surrendered.

Refugees, in a deplorable condition, continue to arrive in Constantinople, and the International Committee will be obliged to stop relief on June 1st, for lack of funds.
