El Medhi's Defeat Biscerated.

CAIRO, Nov. 6. Reports received from the Sudan credit the defeat of El Medhi, the False Prophet. He still continues his march at the head of a very large army, and up to the present has not met with any strong opposition.

Franco-Spanish Difficulty.

PARIS, Nov. 6. Reports received from the Pyrenees state that a serious collision has taken place between the French and Spanish inhabitants, and a great outbreak is anticipated.

The Newfoundland Elections.

ST. JOHN'S, N. F., Nov. 6. A general election for members of the House of Assembly was held in this Province on Saturday. The contest between both parties was brisk. The results show that the Government, led by Hon. Mr. Whiteway, has been sustained by a very large majority.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.

In the case of A. M. Sotelo, who has been on trial for several days, charged with the murder of his brother, by shooting, the jury, to-night, returned a verdict of not guilty. This affair was the outcome of a difficulty in the office of the National Republican (newspaper), some months since, which the two Sotelos visited to demand satisfaction for alleged wrongs received at the hands of the editor. It was charged that the shot which killed Sotelo came from the prisoner's pistol.

HAVANA, Nov. 3.

A fund has been started in Spain for the relief of sufferers by the cyclone in Yucatan. King Alfonso heads the subscription list with \$10,000. The King's sister, the Infanta Isabel, has given \$5,000.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Nov. 3.

Two thousand coal miners in pool number four, on Monongahela river, struck to-day against a reduction of one-fourth a cent per bushel on the mining rates.

LONDON, Nov. 3.

An election for a member of Parliament was held in Edinburgh to-day. Waddy received 8,545 votes and Rerton 7,718; both candidates were Liberals.

LIMA, Oct. 23.

A fight has taken place at Cerillos, in Yca department, between Chilean soldiers and a band of Montoneros, in which 25 of the latter are said to have been killed.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 3.

Fire at 3 o'clock this morning partially destroyed the Arlington Variety Theatre on High street. John Pearson, a young man, was burned to death, and Miss Georgie Supple, one of the attaches, was injured by jumping from the roof, one story high. Madame Busted, the lessee, was also injured by jumping from a window. James Kenny was badly burned, and several others were slightly injured. The fire originated on the stage, and the destruction of property was small.

NAPA, Cal., Nov. 3.

J. W. Simonton, for many years General Agent of the Associated Press at New York, died suddenly last evening, at his residence, near Napa, of heart disease.

CHICAGO, Nov. 3.

At a political meeting in the stock yards last night, a platform containing a large number of persons fell. A dozen or more were injured, five or six quite seriously, one probably fatally.

LARRO, Tex., Nov. 3.

Hostile Indians, numbering about fifty, raided a rancho near the town of Huixachuca, Mexico, last night, taking fifteen or twenty prisoners, capturing a lot of stock and escaped.

PARIS, Nov. 3.

Revolutionary manifestos were posted in Paris and Marseilles last night. They were printed on red paper. Two hundred of them were posted near the Louvre, the palace of the Luxembourg and the Jardin des Plantes. They express the deepest hate for the bourgeoisie and declare war to the death against them. Explosive materials have been discovered in the coal depot and telegraph office at St. Poncein.

PRESSBURG, Hungary, Nov. 3.

Excesses against the Jews here have recommenced. Drunken rioters plundered their shops and killed a woman. Ten rioters have been arrested.

Dynamite in Galway.

After an investigation extending over ten days the men—Patrick Rogerson, Bryan Cornican and William Tansey—who are charged with having attempted to blow up the house of Mr. John Ross Mahon, J. P., with dynamite, have been committed for trial, bail being refused. The offence was committed on the night of the 25th of March, and the prisoners were arrested on information supplied by an informer named James Jones. The evidence of Jones was to the effect that he had been engaged in July, 1881, by a man named Finerty to sink a pump at Four Roads, county Roscommon. He left the work on the 21st of that month, and did not return till the 22d of March, 1882. In the meantime he wrote to Finerty asking him to get a supply of dynamite, and on his return found a quantity of it in a box at Cassin's public house, where he lodged. On the 25th of March, when he went to Cassin's, the prisoner Cornican asked him to go out with him into the yard. Cornican then said they were going to blow up an old house, adding, "We have some charges of dynamite; will you give us more?" Jones said he would, and directly afterward, accompanied by Naughton and Rogerson, went to his room and gave to the latter twelve charges of dynamite, three detonators and two lengths of fuse. After this, while drinking in the taproom, the prisoners told him that £500 was to be got from the Irish Republican Brotherhood for blowing up the house of Mr. Mahon if properly done and lives taken; but only £200 or £300 if they were only partially successful; and

that if the witness Jones went on the job he would get his share. The witness said he would, and told Rogerson to get the dynamite ready. At six o'clock they all started for Mr. Mahon's house, and at seven they were joined by a number of other men. On arriving within 150 yards of the house Rogerson went forward and exploded the dynamite, the rest of the men having their revolvers ready. Directly afterward, to use the witness's own words, he heard "a terrible report like thunder, the loud-st he ever heard," there being "a great glare of light in the sky, while the earth shook around." The witness turned informer to save himself, because he was told that others of the party had given information against him and that a warrant had been taken out for his arrest.

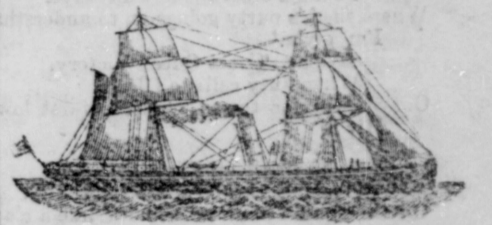
