# North Carolinian Leads At Golf Halfway Mark

WINNIPEG, July 17 (CP)—Johnny Palmer, 34-year-old sun-tanned professional from North Carolina, today led a par-smashing attack in the \$15,000 Canadian open golf championship and wound up with a four-hole lead at the half-way stage of the 72-hole competition.

A professional for 14 years, Palmer faltered only once on today's round—when he three-putted the 18th green where he missed a two-footer—and came in with a 65, a competitive record for the St. Charles Golf and Country Club course. It was his own best score for words. He has never before had an opening-day 65, when he shared the lead with two others, it gave him a total of 131.

Nearest to Palmer in the race for \$3,000 first money came Skee Riegel of Tulsa, Okla., who put together rounds of 66-69 for 135. He yielded two strokes to par on the 17th and 18th holes.

Threatening the leaders with 1364 stood Roberto de Vicenzo of Buenos Aires with 69-67, Dick Mayer of St. Petersburg, Fla., with 67-69 and Dutch Harrison of Ardmore, Okla., with 69-67. Harrison, who hit a tree on the 18th and went one over par, was Canadian open champion in 1949.

Freddy Haas, Jr., of New Orleans had a 68-69 for 137. Smiley Guick of Pasadena and Doug Ford of Harrison, N.Y., were deadlocked at 138. Guick had rounds of 68-70 and Ford of 67-69.

Pat Fletcher of Saskatoon electrified the gallery of some 4,000 and almost stole the show by shooting a hole-in-one in his round of 66. He did all his par-clipping—six strokes—on the out-going nine where he had a 30.

Fletcher, Canadian Professional Golfers Association champion, recovered from his shaky first-day 73. Henry Martell of Edmonton Highlands and Gordon Brydson of Toronto Mississauga were with him in the 139 bracket, Martell with 67-72 and Brydson with 70-69.

# Canadians Win Way To Olympic Hoop Games

HELSINKI, July 17 (CP)—Canada emerged undefeated from the qualifying round of Olympic basketball competition today as Bill Coulthard, six-foot, 175-pound guard scored 17 points to lead the team to a 63-57 victory over Egypt.

The win was the third straight in the preliminary round-robin tournament and qualified Canada for the regular Olympic tournament.

The teams automatically qualified for the final round and Canada now joins them. Five other countries of the 13 taking part in the preliminary round will qualify for regular competition.

Coulthard, veteran of Tillsonburg (Ont.) Livies, Canadian senior basketball champions around which the Olympic squad is built, topped the scoring today with seven field goals and three successful free throws.

Canada was ahead for all but a few moments of the close game. The Canadians were bothered by Egypt's strong zone defence and didn't have the zip of the two previous games in which they defeated Italy 68-57 and Romania 72-51.

The lead 36-31 at half time and the Egyptians were able to cut that margin to two points with only two minutes left in the game.

However, with Egypt pressing, Bill Pataky of Windsor, Ont., smallest man on the Canadian team, broke away for a solo basket which clinched the win.

# Brooklyn Dodgers In 2-1 Win Over Cincinnati To Protect N. L. Lead

Brooklyn Dodgers continued to make hay at the expense of second division opposition Thursday, beating Cincinnati Reds 2-1 in 11 innings to protect their National League lead.

Carl Furillo drove home both runs on singles in the wild game that saw Dodgers Jackie Robinson and Billy Cox ejected in the ninth inning for arguing.

Prescher Roe carried a 1-0 lead into the ninth but the Reds quickly tied it up. Ted Kluszewski singled and Ed Pellegrini went in to run for big Klu. Pellegrini stole second on a delayed steal and Robinson protested bitterly.

The Dodger second baseman kicked his glove into the air and was tossed out by umpire Augie Guglielmo. Cox replaced Robinson but minutes later he, too, was heaved out by Guglielmo for arguing. Pellegrini moved to third on a single by Andy Seminick and scored on pinchhitter Willard Marshall's fly ball.

Roy Campanella singled with one out in the 11th to launch the Dodgers' winning rally. Dick Williams forced Campanella but Duke Snider and Furillo followed with singles to break up the game.

Brilliant pitching also featured the other National League (NL) games. Vern Bickford pitched Boston Braves to a 1-0 triumph over Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates beat Philadelphia in a doubleheader, 2-1 and 4-2.

Bickford scattered seven hits and singled home Ed Mathews with the game's only run in the seventh inning. Paul Minner was the loser. Calvin Hogue, fresh from Charlottetown of the South Atlantic League, allowed only four hits in stopping the Phils in the opener. The start was the first of his major league career.

Ralph Kiner smashed his 17th homer with George Metkovich on base in the ninth inning to win the second game for the Pirates.

Boston Red Sox shaded Chicago White Sox 2-1 in the only American League day game. Sam White's seventh homer and George Kell's run-producing double accounted for both Boston runs in the third-inning. Boston collected only three hits off loser Marv Grissom and Hector Brown.

Dizzy Trout blanked Chicago until the ninth when he ran into trouble. He gave way to Al Benton after Ray Coleman singled. Benton was soiled for two infield hits and Ray Scarborough took over with the bases loaded and none out. Scarborough got out of the jam with only one run scoring.

# Yankees And Cleveland Indians Split Twin Bill

New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians split an American League doubleheader at Yankee Stadium Thursday night enabling the world champions to maintain their 4 1-2 game lead over the Indians.

But Boston Red Sox moved into second place two percentage points ahead of Cleveland, by defeating Chicago White Sox 2-1. Boston also is 4 1-2 games back of the pace-setting Yankees.

Allie Reynolds was knocked out of the box for the first time this season in the opener as Cleveland tied off on him for six runs on as many hits in the two innings he worked. The Indians went on to win 11-6.

In the nightcap, Joe Collins hit a home run with two out in the last half of the ninth inning to give the Yankees a 5-4 decision.

St. Louis Browns hammered out a 9-5 victory over Philadelphia Athletics in the first game of a twin bill but the Athletics came back to take the second 3-1 behind the six-hit pitching of Bobby Shantz.

Leifhander Tommy Byrne led a 16-hit barrage for St. Louis in the Morris Direct (Langille) 1-6 doubleheader. (McArthur) 5-2 a double and a home run. Shantz Joe Ann Castle (McNeil) 3-4 in the nightcap chalked up his Sandy D. (Langille, Jr.) 4-2 16th victory of the season against three losses.

Shantz also started a third inning rally which netted the A's two runs with a single off Ned Garver, starter for the Browns. Garver had to leave the game after four innings because of a sore elbow.

# Olympic Doors Opened To Both Chinese Teams

HELSINKI, July 17 (AP)—After heated debate, the ruling body of the Olympics today threw open the doors to teams from both Communist and Nationalist China. The Nationalists refused to accept the terms and decided on a boycott.

At best, Red China can compete only in swimming. With Red China in, there will be 70 countries and 8,000 athletes. The games open Saturday.

The action of the International Olympic Committee over-ruled J. Sigfrid Edstrom, its president, who announced recently that neither Chinese faction could compete because of non-payment of dues.

Gun Sun Hoh, who pleaded the case of Nationalist China before the committee, protested the "unlawful decision" and refused to let his team participate.

He told the committee he feared one of the team's members, Tung Shou I, had been arrested and probably killed in Communist China. He said he thought a cable sent to the committee and presumably signed by the competitor was faked.

The action of the International Olympic Committee was unprecedented. Hitherto in political disputes a single team has been recognized—or both barred.

"We want them to be here to fraternize with the youth from other nations," said Dr. Otto Mayer, Olympic chancellor.
