

Famed RCMP Musical Ride May Appear in Charlottetown

The world famous RCMP Musical Ride may put in appearance at the Old Home Week fair if plans being made by the Provincial Exhibition Association materialize.

It was noted at the 70th annual meeting of the association held in Charlottetown Tuesday that attempts are being made to have this widely acclaimed attraction appear during fair week which is scheduled August 10-15. The RCMP group has been featured at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto.

Cecil J. Stewart, well known Hampshire breeder, was elected president of the association. Mr. Stewart succeeds Dr. J.P. Lantz, who is retiring because of ill health but will remain as a director of the organization.

Grand Falls Resident Gives Views On Loggers' Strike

The following is the text of a letter received by Mrs. C. W. Deighan of Summerside from her sister Miss Anne O'Keefe of Grand Falls, Newfoundland, which expresses Miss O'Keefe's views on the current loggers' strike in that province:

We are still alive and kicking. The situation is pretty bad here right now. There's not much going on in Grand Falls, but Badger is pretty Grim. Talk about Russian occupation! We've been given a good example of it. Talk about it "not happening here". If the rest of the nine provinces could really realize what Newfoundland has on her doorstep, they wouldn't be so complacent; and neither would they be backing the IWA.

Whatever the CBC and the mainland newspapers get their information is beyond me. It's laughable to us here in Grand Falls, but it is also very sad to think that they shoot off their mouths before they even know anything about the situation. But they go! Thank God for Premier Smallwood. We expect a lot more violence before it is finished. Someday we will be able to tell you all about the situation. There's nothing but smear, lies, lies, lies and more lies coming from the IWA—and now a policeman lies dying in the hospital just because he was trying to preserve the peace, and Mr. Ladd spouts off to the rest of Canada about the "brutality" of the police. The people in Badger are terrified and that is no exaggeration. The IWA have loggers

in from the west coast, Bonne Bay, etc. Even the women are threatening the loggers in the camps. Some of the things that we've learned about the IWA here in Grand Falls, you wouldn't believe. You wouldn't think that such an outfit would exist in Canada.

The way I feel now, that if this is the price of Confederation I'm sorry I ever voted for it. We'd be better off if we were back to where our ancestors started here 500 years ago.

Please pray that there won't be any more violence.

It's terrifying to think that a man might die on account of this strike and that there might be more if something is not done and done soon.

I'm afraid I can't be very light-hearted in this note. There is a cloud over the place.

Court Hearing Is Adjourned

The preliminary hearing of a Charlottetown man charged with obstructing a county sheriff who was executing a writ of seizure was adjourned following completion of evidence in County Magistrate's Court yesterday morning.

When evidence was given by one witness Magistrate Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., adjourned the case for consideration until April 1st.

The witness testified that on the night of Feb. 20th the sheriff procured the services of his tow truck to remove a truck from a garage operated by the accused.

He said he did not complete the towing when warned by the accused not to go onto his (the accused's property). He said he heard the accused say there was a bill against the truck for garage work and he would not allow the vehicle to be removed.

J.O.C. Campbell, Q.C., represents the defence. Crown prosecutor is John P. Nicholson.

The only other case on the docket was that of a resident of Sault St. Marie, formerly of Charlottetown, who pleaded guilty to driving a motor vehicle while impaired by alcohol. He was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days.
