

Red Wings & Rangers In Stanley Cup Finals

Detroit Edges Toronto 1-0 In Overtime Play For All-American Series

DETROIT, April 9 — (CP) — Blonde Leo Reise, firing his second playoff goal of the Stanley Cup series, tonight gave Detroit Red Wings a 1-0 overtime victory over Toronto Maple Leafs before 14,734 fans and sent the victors into the final round of the National Hockey League playoffs against New York Rangers.

A tremendous 10-foot drive off the rugged defenceman's stick whistled by Walter (Turk) Broda in the Toronto nets at 8:39 in the first overtime period and gave the N.H.L. champions a 4-3 margin in games in a thrill-packed semi-final round.

It was Reise's second tally of the series, but both were scored in overtime, breaking up games Red Wings had to win. His score in the fourth game gave Detroit a 3-1 victory and enabled Wings to draw level with Leafs at two games apiece.

First In Seven Years

The Detroit-New York Stanley Cup final will be the first in seven years staged between two American clubs. For Leafs, tonight's loss ended a three-year reign as holders of the trophy.

The victory was the second straight shutout for Detroit goalie Harry Lumley, who blanked Leafs 4-0 in Toronto Saturday night. The scoreless tie at the end of the third period marked the fourth time in seven games that Broda had held Wings scoreless in regulation time.

It was a sweet triumph for Detroit, beaten the last two years by Toronto in the Stanley Cup finals. They will open the championship series against Rangers here Tuesday night according to present plans which await final confirmation by officials of the league and the two teams.

To Play at Toronto

Rangers will play their home games on Toronto ice, because a circus is at Madison Square Gardens in New York this month.

Detroit's victory ended one of the most colorful and bitterly contested series in N.H.L. history.

It started off with a first-game injury that sent Detroit's star wingman Gordie Howe to hospital for a brain operation.

That set the stage for a brawling second game which led the National Hockey League to crack down sharply on the players, even to the extent of putting a second or "assistant" referee into action in the remaining games to quell the potential disorders.

Neither team went in too much for rough stuff tonight as they played a hard-checking tight game. Midway in the final period it became apparent that one goal was going to win this one.

League officials announced after the game that the playoffs would open here Tuesday night, with games at Toronto Thursday and Saturday. Other games were set for April 18, 20, 22 and 23 as needed in the best-of-seven series.

SATURDAY'S GAME

TORONTO, April 9 — (CP) — Detroit Red Wings, backed by faultless netminding by apple-cheeked Harry Lumley, trampled Toronto Maple Leafs 4-0 Saturday night before 14,734 fans and tied up their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final series 3-1.

The Red Wings, back in the sharpshooting form which won them the National Hockey League championship, took control of the game by scoring their first goal less than seven minutes after play

began. From there on they beat back every Toronto challenge, and converting three openings into three more goals of their own.

Right after the game the teams headed for Detroit — the Red Wings by plane and the Maple Leafs by train — for the seventh and deciding contest tonight. The winner goes into a best-of-seven series with New York Rangers for the trophy which the Leafs have won for three successive seasons.

Lumley blocked 21 shots as he scored his first shutout of the series. The Wings fired 21 at Toronto's Turk Broda who had little chance on the four that got past him.

Left winger Marty Pavelich opened the scoring, beating Broda during a gang attack while Toronto's Bill Barilko was serving a charging penalty. Ted Lindsay had a hand in the play.

Centre George Gee got Detroit's second goal with 20 seconds left in the first period. Jack Stewart sent Clare Martin out on a breakaway which caught four Leafs around the Detroit goal. Martin moved slowly down the ice and drew Jim Thomson out of position before sliding a pass to Gee, almost at the goalmouth.

An elbowing penalty to Cal Gardner of the Leafs in the second period, gave the Wings an opening for their third goal. Twenty-five seconds after he went off, Joe Carveth shot a pass to Gerry Couture who had a clear path to the goal with Broda out of position.

Ineffective clearing by the Leafs set up the last Detroit goal, in the third period. The puck came out to Detroit's Jack Stewart who ripped a 10-footer just inside the goalpost.

The Leafs looked good in the opening few minutes, particularly when penalties to Fleming Mackell and Garth Boesch left them two men short for one minute and 21 seconds. Ted Kennedy and Joe Klukay each had a turn as the lone forward on the ice with defencemen Thomson and Gus Merton. They checked so fiercely that the Red Wings only got one shot at Broda.

Nine Penalties

Referee George Gravel called nine penalties in the tough, hard-hitting game. The Leafs drew five and the Red Wings four. Barilko, with two penalties, was the chief offender.

SHERBROOKE, Que., April 9 — (CP) — Sherbrooke Saints advanced to the Eastern Canada senior hockey finals here Saturday. The victory gave the Quebec Senior Hockey League title-holders a clean sweep in their best-of-seven series with the Maritimers. They won the first three games in Sydney by scores of 4-3, 4-2 and 5-3.

The Saints now will meet Toronto Marlboros in a best-of-seven series for the eastern crown with the winner advancing to the Allan Cup finals against the western champions.

Marlboros and Sherbrooke will meet in the first game of their series Wednesday night at Sherbrooke. No other dates have yet been set.

Reg Sinclair proved to be the big gun for the red-clad Saints as he tallied three goals in the final period. Marcel Fillion and Cliff Goupille were the other Sherbrooke marksmen.

TORONTO, April 9 — (CP) — Two unanswered goals in the last period was the margin of victory Saturday as Guelph Biltmores took the Eastern Memorial Cup semi-final series from Porcupine Combines in five games.

TORONTO, April 9 — (CP) — Bill Tobin, president and manager of Chicago Black Hawks, said last night that Charlie Conacher will decide in a couple of days whether he will coach the Hawks in the National Hockey League again next season.

"Charlie wants a day or two to make up his mind whether to continue in hockey or to devote all his time to his oil interests in Western Canada," said Tobin.

Tobin mentioned a report that Conacher might become coach of Boston Bruins and said "Charlie told me he was not interested in the Boston job."

U. S. Sub Makes 21-Day Voyage Without Surfacing

WASHINGTON, April 9 — (AP) — The United States Navy announced today that one of its snorkel-type submarines has made a 21-day, 5,200-mile run from Hong Kong to Pearl Harbor without surfacing.

The precise time during which the submarine Pickrelle relied on its snorkel "breathing" apparatus was given as 505 hours, one hour over 21 days. The submarine dived off Hong Kong March 15 and came up at the Hawaiian naval base April 5.

Cdr. Paul R. Schrats is skipper of the Pickrelle. The submarine was built at the Portsmouth, N. H., naval shipyard and was commissioned April 4, 1949. She went to the Pacific fleet last fall.

The snorkel apparatus with which the latest United States subs are equipped is a breathing tube which extends to the surface. It was developed by Germany during the war, from a Dutch idea. By using the device, the submarine can operate under the surface on its diesel engines, which give it much more speed than can be had from the electric motors previously relied upon for submerged runs.

There is the added advantage of not having to come up to recharge batteries exhausted by the motors.

Thus with the snorkel equipment the time a submarine can stay down has little limitation other than fuel supplies.
