FIRST OF THE SEASON.—Freddie McConnell, eight years old, while skating on Morris' lake, Sackville, N. B., on Monday night, skated into an open space some distance from shore and was drowned. The body has been recovered.

A SAD CASE.—The Boston papers tell a pathetic story of the suicide of George J. Woodman, who was recently found dead on a steamer in Boston harbor. He had killed himself with cyanide of potassium because he could not obtain work.

SLEEP AND HORSES.—On Tuesday Mr. Match sent away 285 sheep and on the following day Mr. Mahoney shipped 285 and Mr. McGrath 204. On Tuesday, too, there were 14 horses on board the steamer, 13 of which were owned by Mr. J. A. Collett of Beauséjour.—Fanner.

POLICE COURT.—During the month of November, ending to-day, there were 18 convictions for drunkenness, 2 for nuisance, 4 for breach of the Liquor Regulation Act; 5 for assault; 1 for breach of the Lord's Day Act. There were three dismissals during the month. The receipts were \$365.45.

PEWEEB.—The glove fight between Dick O'Brien and Jack Macgee, at Providence on a few nights ago, resulted in a victory for the former. In the evening, O'Brien belongs to St. John. Macgee visited Charlottetown a few summers ago, and took part in a sparring exhibition in Scott's Hall.

BOSTON COMEDY COMPANY.—This ever-popular company will open at the Masonic Temple opera house to-morrow (Friday) evening, presenting the great historical drama, "The Siege of Bunker's Hill," with Miss Grey in the title role. On Saturday afternoon there will be a matinee, the play being the "Honey-moon; or how to rule a wife." In the evening, "The Mystery of the White Horse."

SELF-DEFENSE WORK.—There will be a meeting held by the Salvation Army this evening in the basement of the Methodist Brick Church, led by the Esquire. Subject: "The Social Work of the Army." Some of the churches being desirous of giving this scheme their support, the Rev. Mr. Brewer has given the use of the lecture room of the church for each performance.

INQUEST.—The inquest in view of the bodies of John Trainor and Joseph Woods, drowned at Southport on Tuesday night, was begun yesterday afternoon before Cusmer McLeod and a jury composed of Alex. McLean, (foreman) John Joy, Jas. Landrigan, Wm. Hertz, Peter Doyle, Solomon McKenna, and Charles Burns. The witnesses examined during the afternoon were Captain Wiener, Benjamin Robertson, John Flood, Hugh McLean, John Murphy, Angus Macinnis and Henry Metzger. This afternoon the inquest was resumed, when Daniel Gay, Joseph McKenna, A. McInnes and James McCarrou were examined. After about twenty minutes' deliberation the jury returned the following verdict:—

"That the deceased came to their death from drowning by falling off the ship at the Southport Ferry on the evening of the 25th inst. This jury would recommend that the passenger gates leading to the slips on both ferries be securely locked and opened only for passengers boarding or landing from the boat. They also recommend that a watchman be employed at the Southport side and that care for the night boat there be kept in the waiting room, also, that life buoys be kept in both waiting rooms."

MEETING AT DUNDAS.

Report Continued.

Mr. Shaw continuing his speech at the meeting at Dundas, on Monday, the 27th inst., said: The present Government proposed when in opposition to carry on the affairs of the Province without deficits. "Put us in power," they said, "and we will make revenue and expenditure meet." Have they done so? The public accounts for 1891 and 1892 show, that notwithstanding they took over \$72,000 in the Land Office in 1891, at a cost of \$14,000 given away in discounts, and that \$43,000 was taken in 1892, at an expense of over \$4000 wasted in a similar manner, the greater part of which was given to political favorites;—notwithstanding these large amounts drawn from the resources of the Province, in these two years, 1891 and 1892, the deficit of the Peters Government amounted to over \$67,000. The average yearly deficits under the Sullivan and McLeod administrations, were only a little over \$25,000; but those governments added large additions to the revenue of the Province, as shown by the fact that the subsidy from the Dominion increased from \$155,000 in 1879, to \$183,529 in 1890. Mr. Shaw then took up the Public Works Department, and made an exhaustive exposure of the looting and crookedness in that department, showing how public money had been squandered to political favorites in extras on bridges and roads. Space will not permit a more extended report; but the electors present were amazed at the way their money had been spent; and cheered Mr. Shaw for the rights and continuing the Peters administration. He showed that the legislation of the Government in getting out of King's County, by franchising Dominion officials, and taking one vote from the young men, was done for the purpose of maintaining in power a government whose financial management would surely receive condemnation from the electors; and in appealing to the young men to support him he made one of the finest efforts ever heard in King's County. Coming to the policy he would support in the future, he said he would support no government that would not make an effort to equalize revenue and expenditure. Should taxation be necessary to do so, he would support a fair and equitable system that would deal justly by all; and he asked the people of the Cardigan District to support his colleague and himself on those grounds.

Dr. Robertson spoke in favor of the Government, and referred to the debt left by the McLeod Government. He said that if sitting debentures at 4 per cent, with 1 1/2 per cent for a sinking fund, was good financial management, he defended the discounts at the Land Office, the gerrymandering of King's County, the disfranchisement of Dominion officials, and the Amalgamation Bill, and wound up by saying that the Government spent \$35,000 more on roads and bridges in two years than their predecessors had done in the same time. This statement was challenged by Mr. Shaw, who showed that it was utterly untrue according to the figures given in the public accounts. There was no extra expenditure on roads, bridges and wharves until this year; but one can tell that that money was being lavished in a manner unprecedented in the history of the Province.

Speeches were made by Mr. Hughes and Mr. Currie, of Souris, on behalf of the Government, and by Messrs. John McLean, M. P., Hon. Arch. J. Macdonald and Geo. F. Owen on behalf of the Opposition. The meeting was nearly all in support of the Liberal-Conservative party, and when Messrs. James E. Macdonald and Cyrus Shaw were nominated, the enthusiasm was so great that no one ventured to propose the Government candidates. Three cheers were given for Shaw and Macdonald, a like number for the chairman and the Queen, after which the meeting dispersed.

We omitted mentioning that Hon. Mr. Gordon and Arch. J. Macdonald were proposed as candidates for the First District of King's, and the nomination was unanimous. The Government candidates were not even mentioned and did not put in an appearance. Dundas and adjoining settlements are solid for the Opposition.

The Mount Allison Meeting. The meeting held last night at Mount Allison was one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever held there. It was a general meeting of the electors for miles around. Mr. Peters opened the meeting with a tame speech in defence of the Government. He was followed by Messrs. Blake, Stewart and Cumminskey. The Opposition candidates made a great impression, and were loudly cheered. Mr. Cumminskey spoke for only twelve minutes. To the charges made by Blake and Stewart Mr. Peters made no reply. The meeting was largely in favor of the Opposition candidates.

NEW LONDON NOTES. Campbell and McLeod's prospects are growing brighter every day. Sinclair and Warburton are making a house to house canvass, but are coldly received except by the faithful few.

We understand that the Government candidate is circulating stimulants where it is appreciated. The supervisors are their peddlers. It is needless to say that neither of the Government candidates are canvassing votes for prohibition.

All sensible people around here are down on the Peters combination for their interference with returning officer Horn in the discharge of his duties. The thing is too farcical. It certainly looks as if they wanted favors from the deputy returning officer.

MEETING AT DONAGH. Owing to the bad condition of the roads the meeting at Donagh on Tuesday evening was not largely attended. Speeches were made by the candidates, Blake and Stewart, Peters and Cumminskey. The Premier did not have much to say in favor of the Government. Mr. Cumminskey's speech was composed of a pig story. Messrs. Blake and Stewart spoke with telling effect. The meeting was 2 to 1 in favor of the Opposition candidates.

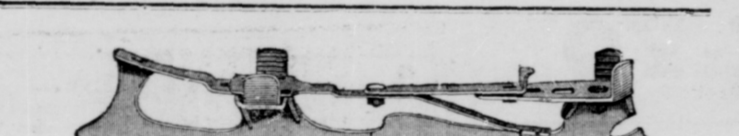
