Janowicz, a triple-threat half-back at Ohio State and a 1949 all-American, signed for a reported \$25,000 bonus with the Pirates in 1953.

"But you can see for yourself I'm not getting anywhere playing professional baseball," he said Wednesday. "I love baseball better than football but apparently I'm not making the grade."

"I haven't talked to Branch Rickey (general manager of the Pirates) about playing professional football because I haven't made up my mind what I'm going to do. "That much can tell you. I have received several feelers from a Canadian team. I also talked with Washington Redskins this spring but nothing ever came of it."

His two-year bonus contract with Pirates expires at the end of the current season.

RESEARCH IN OYSTER CULTURE AT ELLERSLIE REVIEWED IN BOOKLET

OTTAWA, (Special) — Some of the most advanced and effective research work on oyster culture is being carried out at the Fisheries Research Board substation at ELLERSLIE, Prince Edward Island. This is set forth in the fisheries department publication "Trade News" issued here Wednesday.

The practice of making oyster farming a profitable business first began at the ELLERSLIE substation and similar experiments are now being carried out in the Bras D'Oie Lakes in Cape Breton, Malagash, N.S., and St. Andrews, N.B. This year and last.

A special series of experiments in oyster culture is being carried out in a tidal pool at ELLERSLIE, during the summer months. The pool is particularly valuable for determining the inroads of ice damage and winter killing of the molluscs. The bottom of the pool at ELLERSLIE was hardened with small-sized gravel.

Other methods of coping with the eel-grass menace in oyster beds has been the laying of aliped paper on oyster grounds, or covering eel-grass beds with sand, clam-shells. Oyster shells and concrete.
