THE KINETOSCOPE.
RECENT USE OF THE INVENTION
THE STUDY OF DISEASE.

Edison's Part in the Perfection of the
Wonderful Machine—What May be Ac-
complished by His Other Inventions in
Similar Directions.

The invention of the kinetoscope,
which is at present attracting a large
amount of popular interest, resembles
some of Mr. Edison's inventions in being
really an improvement on an adaptation
of discoveries of other men. This in
no way implies that the fame of the
American inventor is undeserved. On
the contrary, it is due to his genius
that mere experiments and scientific
realizations have been converted into
things of real and lasting benefit to
civilization. Sir Humphrey Davy discovered
that carbon could be rendered incandescent
in a current of electricity, and that oxygen
could be consumed, but he remained
for Edison to exclude oxygen and to
give the electric light to civilization.
The main essentials of the kinetoscope
were in use before Edison conceived the
idea of making a practical use of the
machine. The Mybridge photographs
were the forerunners of the kinetoscope.
It has been proclaimed, says the
Boston Advertiser, that the time is now
at hand when books and theatres will
become rarities, and the average citizen
will be content to use the kinetoscope
and the phonograph for his pastime.
Such a prediction is over-optimistic,
yet, for the reason that these inventions
are not yet perfect. The beauty of
concerted music or of rare singing is
still marred by the electric whir and
the false sounds that issue from the
photograph's diaphragm. The splendid
color and dancing light of the opera's
stage are yet beyond the grasp of the
kinetoscope. Perhaps these things may
come some day, but they have not yet
come, and in the meantime the present
generation is concerned chiefly with the
things of today. The telephone, for
instance, is of more immediate use to
civilization than are the phonograph
and kinetoscope combined.

Science has already found certain uses
for Mr. Edison's later inventions, how-
ever. The phonograph commends itself
permanently many sounds that are useful
to therapeutics; the normal and unusual
heartbeats, "rales" in the lungs, certain
vocal sounds depending upon special
conditions of the throat and tonsils. It
is of decided benefit to science to have
permanent records that can always be
referred to. Such records are of great
value in the study of the human voice,
and in the study of the human eye. The
Mybridge photographs showed
some years ago that the eye was un-
reliable for the detection of the absolute
details of rapid animal motion. Instan-
taneous photography alone gives a cor-
rect representation of the life that is
taken by men or animals in rapid
action, and it is quite possible that medi-
cal science may achieve fresh discoveries
by the help of the kinetoscope. Thus,
in studying the muscular action that re-
sults from certain nervous disorders, it
may be possible to trace the nerves
which are affected. Even in less com-
plicated cases, like lameness, a surgeon
may be able to reach conclusions with
great quickness and certainty by secur-
ing the details of muscular action of the
affected limb as the speed of the kine-
toscope may be regulated at will. Al-
together, then, while the reproduction of
grand opera for the multitude may be
a matter of the remote future, the kine-
toscope is something of more use to civ-
ilization than a mere pictorial toy.

Riches in the Hawaiian Islands.
The Hawaiian Islands have been found
to be rich in minerals. As a result of a
year's investigation by the British Asso-
ciation, through its committee, it has
been found that of birds there are 78
species, of which 50 are peculiar to this
group. All the land and fresh water
shells are peculiar, and of 1,000 species
of insects 70 are not found elsewhere.
This seems that these islands have by
no means been populated from the con-
tinent, but have been centers of indepen-
dent creation.

FACULTY OF PROPHECY.
INTUITIVE SENSE AS DEVELOPED IN
BUSINESS MEN.

**John M. Smyth's Foresight—When Every-
body Went in for Boom Times He Be-
came Conservative With the Very Best
of Results—Why Did He Do It?**

The intuitive faculty is strongly de-
veloped in the mind of the successful
business man. Perhaps, if I put it in
another way, the force of this declara-
tion, which is not made in an off-hand
manner, but as the result of some care-
ful observation, will be more keenly
felt by the casual reader. Let it be re-
corded, therefore, that the business
man who is not endowed with the
faculty of intuition is rarely successful,
and never except as the result of chance.

John M. Smyth is a great merchant
and a very wealthy man. He is also a
logician. His name is familiar to every
man and woman, and pretty nearly to
every child in Chicago. It is a name
that stands high in this community.
His business methods are not only ir-
reproachable, but admirable. He pos-
sesses the intuitive faculty to a remark-
able degree. He is under no obligations
to chance. He has never speculated,
to chance. He has never made a hap-
pazard move in his life. His reasoning
force would not permit him to do so. I
have personal knowledge of one instance
which illustrates his method of dealing
with business problems. We all re-
member how the spring of 1893
opened up in Chicago. There was a ros-
coped tint in the atmosphere. The sun,
moon and stars revolved around this
city. The earth, and all that was
beneath the earth, and all that would
be ours, before the year closed. We had
only to reach for what we wanted. If
there was anything we wanted that we
did not see, all we had to do was to
reach for it. Every man had a scheme.
Most men had two or three. It was going
to be the greatest year Chicago ever saw
—the greatest year for everybody. Even
the ordinarily conservative business
man was planning for extraordinary ex-
pansion. Those who failed to hit upon
any other means of making a fortune
invariably went into the hotel, and a por-
tion of the bill down and promise to
pay the remainder in instalments, and
—there you were, again! It so happen-
ed that nearly all the world's fair hotels,
good, bad and indifferent, were com-
pleted and ready for furnishing at the
same time.

It was late in the afternoon of that day
before Mr. Smyth entered his store. He
had been making business calls down-
town. There was nothing unusual in
the appearance of things as he passed
through the swinging doors. He was
met at the door by the manager, and he
glanced around with the eyes of a man
brought of a well founded belief in the
system and discipline which prevails in
his establishment. He was seen to con-
verse with a few persons, awaiting him,
in the main lobby. Then it was
noticed that he appeared thoughtful
in deep thought. This lasted but a
few moments and then he went into his
private office. He knew absolutely noth-
ing of the demands made upon the re-
sources of the house by the hotel man-
agement. It was not until about five
minutes he summoned his principal
assistants and heads of departments.
Without making any preliminary re-
marks he addressed them in about these
words: "I will dispose of sixty of our
debtors to-morrow. We shall not
be using the number of weeks we have
been using for some time to come. We
will suspend all orders upon the fac-
tories except those necessary to keep the
stock complete. All orders looking to
the increase of our stock must be con-
sidered. The world's fair hotels are
being opened with world's fair hotels. Do
no business with this class of customers
except on a cash basis. During this
year we will confine ourselves more
strictly than ever to our legitimate line
of furnishing of homes. We are
going to have a period of great progres-
sion. I don't care to cut down the
force, but this would be an excellent
time to give our employes vacations.
Their vacations may be arranged for in
the different departments so that our
interests will not suffer. I want more
than ordinary care exercised in our
credit department." That was all. It
was not thought necessary nor deemed
expedient by the assistants or heads of
departments to discuss or argue the
matter with their chief.

The world's fair managers, except in
a few instances, when their standing
was unquestionable, did not have their
orders filled. The letters, cablegrams
and telegrams to factories were recalled.
The clerks were sent to the office.
There was a general cutting down of ex-
penditures. A more rigid inquiry into the character
of applicants for credit. All these things
occurred while the business boom of '93
was at its height, and long before the
collapse came. What was it that told
John M. Smyth to take this course?
Some people will call it business in-
stinct. No, it was more than that. It
was the faculty of looking into the
future—the faculty of intuition. It
was that strange mental faculty which
enables the truly successful business
man to look behind appearances for
realities; to control the emotional, to
subordinate everything to reason.—Chi-
cago Herald.
