

Sees Island Headed For Banner Tourist Season

"It would appear that we are headed for our best tourist year, with inquiries still being received in record volume," George V. Fraser, Director of the Prince Edward Island Travel Bureau, told The Guardian yesterday as he released statistics regarding the number of inquiries received during the month of June, 1957, which totalled 3,626. In June, 1956, 2,657 inquiries were received. Thus, 1,569 more letters have been received in June of the current year, which fact bodes well for a record tourist year. Electric Service League Meeting

Directors and committee chairman of the Electric Service League of P.E.I. met yesterday afternoon at Burke Electric, Charlottetown, to hear reports of the various committees.

W.V. Burke, chairman, opened the meeting and reports were heard from the constitution finance and standards committees.

Reporting for the constitution committee, E.S. Chandler stated his committee was working over various constitutions from other provinces and that a suggested constitution for P.E.I. would be drawn up in the near future.

A.E. MacLean, chairman of finance, submitted a budget for the balance of 1957 which was adopted and passed unanimously. This committee has also been asked to prepare a budget for 1958.

The standards committee, represented by W.R. Brennan, chairman, reported a review of Red Seal Standards now in use by other Leagues, and stated that a set standards for local use would be prepared within the next ten days.

To Set Off Huge Rocket On Scientific Mission

OTTAWA (CP)—A 41-year-old Canadian biologist will spend the next months in remote Central Australia trying to learn whether the area's aborigines can make it easier for Canadians to live and work in the frigid north.

Dr. J. S. Hart, head of the animal physiology section of the division of applied biology of the National Research Council, will make the study as a member of an international anthropological expedition. The team also includes biologists from the United States, Sweden and Norway. Dr. Hart now is flying to Australia.

Members of the expedition will spend July and August, winter months in Australia, living with the aborigines. They are interested in learning how these primitive natives are able to live naked throughout the year, even in low-freezing weather.

SAME PICTURE

The council said recent investigations on humans have revealed much the same picture.

Dr. Hart and other members of the team plan to measure the heat-generating capabilities of the aborigines, especially at night. This will be accomplished through the use of special equipment to collect and measure gases exhaled by the sleeping aborigine.

The council said the equipment will be encased in an airtight ventilated headbox slipped over the head of the sleeper. It is designed so that it interferes little with sleeping.

Potatoes Need DDT Just Now

Flea beetles are still quite numerous, but they should begin to disappear in another week reports Weekly Potato Bulletin No. 30. Webworms are causing damage in many potato fields by rolling or tying the leaves together with fine threads and feeding inside. DDT 50 per cent wettable powder, two pounds in 100 gallons, or DDT 25 per cent emulsion, one quart in 100 gallons of water, will control both these species.
