Don't Know Him.

EDMUNSTON, Dec. 18.—John Hartt, brother-in-law of Hon. John Costigan, Minister of Inland Revenue, died to-day.

The Railway Blamed.

MONTREAL, Dec. 18.—The Coroner's Jury, who have been sitting almost a week on the death of engineer Baras, who went over the Lacine wharf with his engine, a few days ago, returned a verdict to-day in which they seriously blame the Grand Trunk Company for not providing proper appliances, and for having obliged switchman Buboise to work at the Willows 12 hours at night work in 24.

Good Riddance to It.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—The front walls of the Finiahaefer Brewing Co's Brewing Malt house, Park Avenue and 51st Street, collapsed and fell into the street this morning. Fifty-five thousand bushels of malt were split in a heap on Park Avenue. No one was injured. The malt was valued at \$50,000, and may be a total loss. The building was damaged to the extent of \$15,000.

A Blow at Reciprocity.

LINDSAY, Dec. 18.—Unrestricted Reciprocity received a blow in South Victoria to-day when Fairbairn, Conservative, was elected by 100 majority. Despatches from Toronto say that the Conservatives are jubilant, and a great many would like to see the veteran Premier appeal at once to the country.

The Death Penalty.

WELLAND, Ont., Dec. 18.—A Hoyt Day was held to-day for having pushed his wife over a precipice at Niagara Falls some time since, the body of the woman being found and Day's sister who accompanied the couple over from Buffalo let the police into the secret of her brother's dastardly act. As Radcliffe had to go to Sherbrooke to hang Benoit Lamontagne to-morrow morning he could not operate, but furnished a substitute who gave his name as Bill. The latter performed his work as if he had been an expert, and Day died without pain. The doomed man sang hymns in his cell nearly all night, and said he was happy and ready to die. Last evening Day wrote to his brother in Kensington penitentiary that he was happy as a lark and hoped his relatives were in the same condition. He walked to the scaffold without flinching, and as the boys say, died game.
