GOLD IN MUNIAC, N. B.—The St. John's is informed that a Scotch woman, some little time since, while washing clothes in Muniac, found a piece of quartz rich in gold, for which she received \$5 from a person who knew its value. A number of parties are again at work on this stream washing for gold, and are succeeding in obtaining it, but in what quantities we cannot say. T. W. Longstaff, Esq., we are informed, is at the head of the operation.

On Saturday last the work of removing the hull of the *Emigrant* was commenced and since that time a diver and a number of men have been engaged at removing lumber etc., which is sunk in her hold. To-day a small blast of dynamite was set off under the hull for the purpose of loosening this lumber. It was reported that the main blast would be set off this morning and a large crowd assembled on Connolly's breastwork to witness the explosion. It will probably take place to-morrow.

The American newspapers are unanimous in the declaration that the business depression has passed over, and that the people are in the full swing of prosperity. The New York *Star* says that "to-day Americans are the most thriving people on earth; factories, mills and furnaces are all going, while countless tonnage is engaged in carrying our produce across the Atlantic to Europe." Even the book trade, the first industry to suffer and the last to revive, is beginning to look up.

THE DOMINION WIMBLEDON.

OTTAWA, Sept. 19.

This morning the competitors in the rifle matches were greeted with the most favorable weather they have yet had; although the variations of light and shade somewhat interfered with the competitors.

It is expected that the ceremony of presenting the prizes will take place on Tuesday afternoon next in the Senate Chamber, admission being by ticket. All the prizes will then be presented. The Governor General's badges are to be awarded to the competitor making the highest score in the Governor Generals match, and each of the nine next highest competitors. The badges are somewhat similar to that of the "Queen's Sixty" at Wimbledon. The ground-work is of blue and white; over it is a silver band with the words, "Governor General's Prize." In the centre, on a red groundwork, is the letter "L."

Owing to the large number of entries this year, which are double what they have ever been before, it is likely that in future the number of targets will be increased to twenty.

This p. m., Mr. Gzowski gave another reception.

About two o'clock the McDougall challenge cup match was concluded, the cup being won by Private Anderson, of the Governor General's Foot Guards, who, it might be remarked has been most successful so far.

At the 400 yards range Private Morrison of the Governor General's Foot Guards and Quarter Master Stenhouse, of Montreal, each made the highest possible scores, but at the 600 yards range they fell behind again.

Notice to Contractors.

SEALED TENDERS, addressed to the Secretary of Public Works, and endorsed "Tender for Canal and Lock at St. Anne," will be received at this office until the arrival of the Eastern and Western mails on FRIDAY, the 10th DAY OF OCTOBER next for the construction of a Lock and the formation of approaches to it on the landward side of the present lock at St. Anne.

A map of the locality, together with plans and specification of the works to be done, can be seen at this office and at the Resident Engineer's office, at St. Anne, on and after SATURDAY, the 27th DAY OF SEPTEMBER next, at either of which places printed forms of tender can be obtained.

Contractors are requested to bear in mind that tenders will not be considered unless made strictly in accordance with the printed forms, and, in the case of firms, except there are attached the actual signatures, the nature of the occupation and residence of each member of the same, and further, an accepted bank cheque for the sum of \$2,000 must accompany the tender, which sum shall be forfeited if the party tendering declines entering into contract for the works at the rates and on the terms stated in the offer submitted.

The cheque thus sent in will be returned to the respective parties whose tenders are not accepted.

For the due fulfilment of the contract satisfactory security will be required by the deposit of money to the amount of five per cent. on the bulk sum of the contract; of which the sum sent in with tender will be considered a part. Ninety per cent. only of the progress estimates will be paid until the completion of the work.

To each tender must be attached the actual signatures of two responsible and solvent persons, residents of the Dominion, willing to become sureties for the carrying out of these conditions, as well as the due performance of the works embraced in the contract.
