**A TELEPATHIC EXPERIMENT.**

How to Demonstrate This Curious Power by a Simple Device.

A very interesting experiment in the fascinating science of telepathy, vouchered for as being sure to "come out right" by such high authority as Hudson, author of "The Law of Psychic Phenomena" and other works of the same order, may be tried at any time by our readers.

One of these very next evenings, when the family are comfortably settled after dinner or supper, the experimenter should introduce the subject of mind reading or telepathy, which will usually create an interest even in the most sceptical. Read the evening paper in the room, curled up in her favorite corner. Now will be the opportunity to become a hero even in one's own household, for we are told that, like a good recipe for cake or what not, if directions given below are strictly followed success is sure.

Let a circle be formed by a few persons joining hands, and one member of the circle be secretly blindfolded, that is in such a way that he will enter into a darkness so dense that it may "be felt." To secure this desired trick darkness, fold a pair of kid gloves into several thicknesses and place like a pad one over each eye, with an ample handkerchief bound tightly over all and around the head. Now let a card be selected at random from a pack, take great care that no one sees any other card of the pack, even for an instant, then place where all can see it except of course the blind man. The rest of the circle must now fix their minds and gaze upon the card with every bit of earnestness they have in their nature. In the meantime the blind man must put himself into a quiet, passive "Barkis is willin'" state of mind. He will soon begin to see (scientific authority for this, remember,) indistinct objects floating in the darkness. Soon they will begin to take shadowy shape, then disappear, take more definite form, and finally the card selected will appear.

Mr. Hudson declares that out of the six in the company when he witnessed this experiment each scored a sufficient number of successes to remove the result from the domain of coincidence. It is well to bear in mind that sometimes the information is conveyed from one mind to another allegorically, for instance, during the evening mentioned the ten of diamonds appeared as ten flashing diamonds.

Surely this is well worth a trial.—Louisville Courier-Journal.

**A SWINDLING BICYCLIST.**

He Rides a New Machine Each Season at a Cost of \$5 or \$10.

"I had gone up against a varied assortment of swindling games since I went into the bicycle business," said the manager of a down town bicycle agency yesterday, "but before I got into this line I was in charge of an installment house and before that was cashier in a Broadway hotel, so I had my eyeteeth out, you may say. But I've unearthed a gentlemanly crook whose game is not only novel, but smooth as silk, and he is absolutely the limit in my wide acquaintance with bicycle swindlers.

"Each season for three years to my knowledge this fellow has sported a new machine of standard make, with all the up to date accessories. At the end of the season he discards that wheel, and when spring comes around, with young, tender, green blades of grass in the parks and equally green and tender chumps like myself doing business in the bicycle line, this chap will be seen on another wheel, the newest model, the most popular make and with the latest trimmings. His season's riding doesn't cost him over \$10, and that's his record for three years, if not longer.

"I'll tell you how he does it. In the first place, he has an honorable profession and a wide acquaintance. In the next place, he is naturally a swindler. In the last place, we bicycle dealers and agents will stand a great deal before acknowledging that we have lost a deal or a wheel.

"The modus operandi of the gentleman whose bicycles have been dirt cheap for him is as follows: Several years ago at the beginning of the road season he presented his card and his impressive personality at the down town agency for a well known make of bicycle.

"I don't want to waste time in poking over cheap articles," he said. "I want only the best and that quickly."

"Of course the salesman was delighted. The professional man's eye lighted on a wheel that was 'one in a thousand,' as the makers of rifle barrels say. He examined it critically, put in a few objections to the make of tires and the saddle, just to show that he knew all about wheels and wheeling, and he wound up by saying carelessly:

"Ship it to my home address and send the bill to my office. I shall expect to try the machine and test it to my satisfaction."

"The salesman, a trifle flustered, went back to the credit clerk, showed the customer's professional card, and was told to get a cash deposit of \$25, two references, and an agreement to pay so much a month on the price.

"Mr. Professional Man beamed upon the salesman, furnished the references, giving the names of two gentlemen well known on Newspaper row, and in commercial circles, but—he had only \$10 to spare, and presumed that would suffice as a guarantee of good faith. His references proved O. K. He got the wheel. All the firm received was that solitary payment of \$10. They allowed the first month to expire without sending him a statement. The next month, June, they respectfully requested a payment on account. In July, August and September ditto, the requests increasing in businesslike terms, but with no perceptible effect upon the customer, who meanwhile rode that \$10 wheel for all he was worth. In October the credit man complained to the head of the firm, and a peremptory notice was sent to the delinquent. It read something like this:

"Sir—You have used the Spokeless machine No. 0000 six months and paid only \$10 on account. If you do not call at once and settle in full, we shall be compelled to forcibly remove the wheel from your possession."

"The gentlemanly crook had expected just such a denouncement. He promptly replied, curtly informing the firm that the Spokeless wheel did not come up to representation, and that unless it was removed at once from his premises he should be obliged to put it in storage at the expense of the dealers.

"Each year since that fellow has played the same game on some bicycle house which does business on the installment plan. Not only is he not ashamed of such contemptible trickery, but he actually boasts of his success in getting a season's sport on a new standard wheel for little or nothing."—New York Sun.
