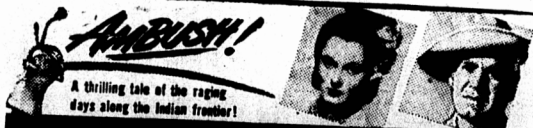

"THE OYSTER MAN" NOW SHOWING AT THE PRINCE EDWARD

Stewed, fried, or on the half shell, oysters are a tasty morsel. So says the commentator in the Department of Fisheries' newest film, "The Oyster-Man". Now showing at the Prince Edward Theatre. This is the first showing in Canada of this outstanding film, which was filmed entirely in Prince Edward Island.

The film explains in simple, straightforward, non technical language and visual treatment, the various phases of oyster cultivation. Through the medium's unique facility for portraying within a few minutes screen time developments that actually require several years to accomplish, learn about each stage of the oyster's life from spat collecting, through seeding, tending and growing and harvesting.

Dramatic underwater scenes show how predator star-fish are literally "mopped up" from the sea bottom. Harvesting operations and reference to federal government inspection and grading is followed by pictorial and commentary reference to the delectable eating qualities of Canadian oysters.

The film was produced for the federal Department of Fisheries by the National Film Board with the scientific and technical advice of the Fisheries Research Board of Canada and the Inspection and Consumer Service of the Department.

The artistic quality of the photography makes "The Oyster-Man" a film that is informative as well as interesting.

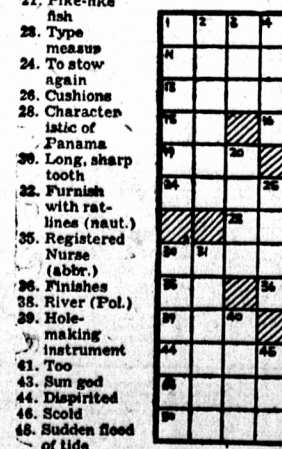
