## Queen Elizabeth Complains Of Cameramen's Intrusion

LONDON (Reuters) — Queen Elizabeth has complained to the Press Council about attempts by press photographers to intrude upon the privacy of herself and her sister, Princess Margaret, the council said here.

The council, a watchdog on a British newspaper ethics, examined two complaints, condemning the actions of one photographer and strongly censuring another.

It also warned newspapers: "Editors should exercise care in publishing photographs of the Royal Family taken in circumstances which appear to involve intrusion into their private lives."

**CAMERAMEN CAUGHT**  
Pictures in the other Sunday paper, The People, were confined to Princess Margaret, showing her in the water, a third in a swim suit with rubber top for water skiing and a fourth, dressed, barefoot, carrying her wet bathing suit.

A letter from the Queen's press secretary said a Daily Express photographer, Robert Haswell, and a freelance photographer, a Mr. Wilnot, were discovered lying in the undergrowth in Sunning Hall Park with their cameras trained on a hut where Princess Margaret was changing her clothes to go water-skiing.

The palace official's letter said that Haswell and Wilnot were escorted from the private property and prevented from taking any pictures.

The council said Robert Edwards, editor of The Daily Express, had expressed his regret

that there had been need to explain about the conduct of Haswell. He described him as having been "over-zealous".

Edwards added that a picture of Princess Margaret and her husband, the Earl of Snowdon, on the lake, taken from a public footpath, had appeared in The Daily Express about a month previously and if it had been known that the Royal Family regarded photographs of them on the lake as an intrusion into their privacy, he would have given instructions that no further pictures were to have been taken and no doubt all other editors would have acted similarly.

## Estimate 76 To Be Killed On 2 Weekends

OTTAWA (CP) — The Canadian Highway Safety Council has estimated 76 persons will be killed in highway accidents during the Christmas and New Year's holiday weekends.

W. Arch Bryce, executive director of the council, said vigilance and devotion of police forces throughout Canada have made New Year's "the safest of all national holiday weekends in highway traffic."

But even with this, the council said, "at least 26 Canadians will die in traffic" during the 78-hour period starting at 6 p.m. local time New Year's eve and ending midnight Sunday.

The toll for the 84-hour Christmas weekend, from noon Thursday to midnight Sunday, may reach 50, the council said.

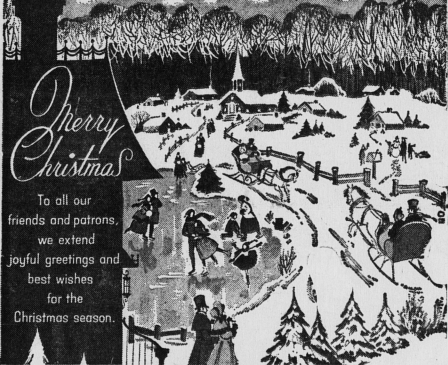

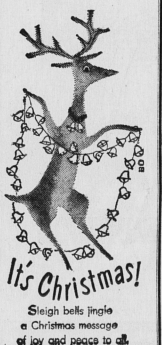

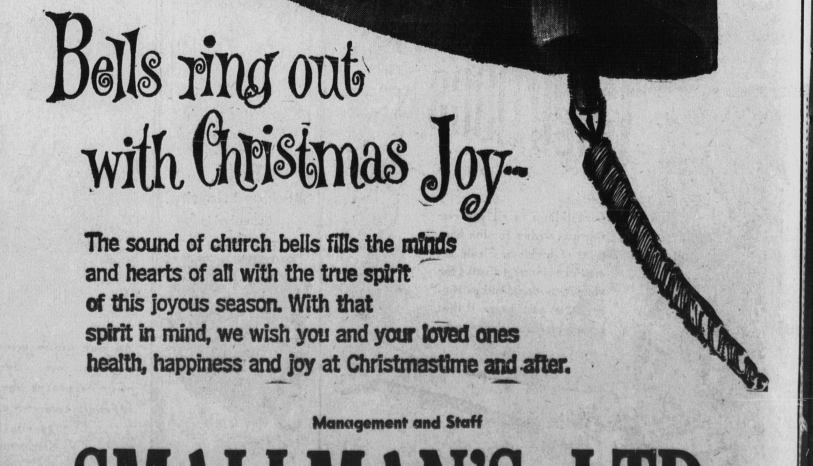
