End Of Strike Imminent As Another Liner Sails — LONDON (Reuters)—The 22,000-ton Cunarder Saxonia sailed from Liverpool for Quebec Friday night, dealing a new blow at the unofficial strike of seamen which last week threatened to paralyze Britain's transatlantic transport.

The Saxonia, an early casualty of the holdup which began almost a month ago, carried 930 passengers. Only 50 men voted to carry on the stoppage. Shipping companies now are drawing up plans for further sailings. The 13,365-ton Parthia is being prepared to leave Liverpool for New York today and the 27,666-ton Britannic will sail in a few days.

The men's demands include better conditions aboard ship. A parallel dock strike in its fifth week, was creeping slowly toward a settlement Friday.

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Canada's Foreign Trade Deficit Higher For May

OTTAWA (CP)—Canada's vital foreign trade continued to expand in May, but a sharp jump in imports from the United States produced a \$62,100,000 deficit, biggest in 11 months. It compares with a small \$300,000 surplus in May last year and is the highest deficit since the \$69,000,000 in June 1954.

Bureau of statistics figures released Friday showed that May's exports increased by \$12,900,000 to \$372,900,000 from \$360,000,000 last year. This boosted the total for the first five months of 1955 by \$155,600,000 to \$1,680,000,000, highest since 1952.

However, imports made a more spectacular rise increasing in May by \$75,300,000 to \$435,000,000 from \$359,700,000 last year and boosting the five-month total by \$74,300,000 to \$1,809,300,000, just below the record \$1,810,300,000 in 1953.

Imports from U. S. JUMP — The highlight in May was in buying from the U. S. Imports from U. S. in that month jumped by \$60,200,000 to \$320,200,000 from \$260,000,000 last year.

In other words, Canada purchased about 75 per cent of her total imports from the U. S. in May compared with 71 per cent last year. During May, Canada's exports to the U. S. increased slightly to \$221,800,000 from \$213,000,000 in May 1954.

Shipments to Britain rose in the month to \$67,200,000 from \$58,000,000 and in the five months to \$321,500,000 from \$324,200,000.
