

Former World Champion Heavyweight Boxer Dies; Burns Held Title 1906-08

VANCOUVER (CP)—Tommy Burns, world heavyweight boxing champion from 1906 to 1908, died in hospital here Tuesday. He was 74.

The colorful oldtimer came here a few days ago from his home at Colaling, Calif., to enter a religious order. He collapsed during the morning, apparently from a heart condition, and died a few hours later in the Vancouver General Hospital.

Clamps 90-Day Ban On Boxing In Pennsylvania

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP)—Governor George M. Leader Tuesday suspended boxing in Pennsylvania for 90 days as an aftermath of the sudden collapse of light heavyweight Harold Johnson in the ring during a nationally televised bout with Julio Mederos in Philadelphia last Friday night.

The governor's ban—announced after a 90-minute meeting with members of the state athletic commission—does not affect fights already scheduled and advertised.

Alfred M. Klein, a member of the athletic commission, said a complete report on Johnson's condition after he was carried from the ring on a stretcher showed he "undoubtedly had drugs in his body."

Earlier in Philadelphia, a police source disclosed that an urine analysis performed on Johnson revealed the presence of barbiturate.

Johnson, No. 1 contender for the 175-pound crown and a 4-to-1 favorite in the scheduled 10 rounder, collapsed in his corner and was unable to answer the bell for the third round. Mederos was awarded a technical knockout victory.

The police source, which declined to be identified, said the information on the urine analysis

was obtained from hospital officials. He said the finding did not mean Johnson was under the influence of the drug.

The police source said authorities are inclined to discount Johnson's post-fight tale of an orange given him the day of the fight by a swarthy stranger and which the fighter is supposed to have complained tasted bitter and made him sick in the dressing room.

Newcombe Returns From Doghouse To Hurl One-Hitter For Rampaging Brooks

Big Don Newcombe hauled himself from the Brooklyn doghouse in the grand manner Tuesday as he pitched a one-hitter to give Dodgers a 3-0 decision over Chicago Cubs.

The temperamental Negro right-hander who was suspended for a day last week for refusing to pitch batting practice faced a minimum 27 batters. A single by second baseman Gene Baker in the fourth inning was the Cub's only hit and Baker was out trying to steal second. Newcombe needed only 96 pitches, striking out six and walking none.

It was the Dodgers' 11th straight victory and their 22nd win against two losses.

The only other major league afternoon action was in the American League where the Chicago White Sox handed Boston its fifth straight defeat, 4-2.

Three night games were scheduled in the National League and three in the American League.

The White Sox relied on home runs by George Kell, Jim Rivera and Chico Carrasquel for all runs against Boston. Kell's two-run homer in the eighth broke a tie and gave Harry Dorish, second of three White Sox hurlers, his first victory of the year.

Hardluck Tom Brewer of the Red Sox was charged with his fifth loss without a victory.

Duke Snider's ninth homer of the year, started Dodgers off in the sixth inning. Newcombe contributed to his fourth victory of the season with a single in the seventh that moved Don Hoak to third, from where he scored on a sacrifice fly.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Tricky, reliable Johnny Antonelli, assisted by Willie Mays' homers and a four-run sixth inning, Tuesday night led the New York Giants to an 8-4 win over the Cincinnati Redlegs.

The game was split wide open in the sixth inning when the Giants scored four runs, routing Johnny Klippstein. The sixth inning spree shattered a 2-2 tie.

Mays blasted his first homer over the centre field fence in the big inning.

Klippstein was replaced by Art Fowler, who stopped the scoring for the inning.

The Reds opened the scoring with a home run in the first by third baseman Chuck Harmon. It was his third this season. This was matched in the second when Hank Thompson smashed one over the right field screen.

The Reds perked up for a seventh inning rally with two runs, including a homer by Wally Post.

The final Giant score came on another Mays home run, his sixth of the season.

Erskine, Antonelli In Race For Earned Runs

NEW YORK (AP)—Carl Erskine, of Brooklyn and Johnny Antonelli of New York Giants were locked in a close battle for the National League earned run lead Tuesday with the Dodgers' pitcher having the edge.

Erskine, undefeated in five decisions, has given up eight earned runs in 50 innings for an earned run mark of 1.44, figures compiled by The Associated Press disclose.

Antonelli, the ERA leader in 1954 with 2.29, has permitted nine earned runs in 48 frames for a 1.69 average. The young lefthander has won two games and dropped three.

In the American League, Dick Donovan of Chicago White Sox is the pace-setter with 1.24 on only four untailed tallies in 29 innings.

Donovan, who saw limited service with Boston of the National League in 1950, 1951 and 1952 and Detroit in 1954, won his first major league game last April 29.

ST LOUIS (AP)—Bill Virdon's two-run homer in the 10th inning Tuesday night broke a seven game losing streak for the St. Louis Cardinals and handed the Philadelphia Phillies a 10th consecutive defeat, 5-3.

Virdon's homer, was his fourth of the year.

Benefiting from the homers—Stan Musial and Bill Sarni hit others—was rookie Puerto Rican southpaw Luis Arroyo, who scored his second big league victory, Del Ennis hit a fourth inning homer for Phillies.
