## Fire In Ontario Farmhouse Takes Lives Of Mother And Six Children; Father Injured

MARMORA, Ont. (CP)—Flames leaped through an isolated farmhouse early Wednesday taking the lives of a mother and six children and severely injuring the father when he tried to beat his way into the building to rescue them.

Mrs. Jessie Jones, 35, Phyllis, 17, Elwood, 12, Harold, 11, Ernest, 9, Wanda, 3, and June, 1, were asleep upstairs when the fire broke out in the two-storey frame house about 6 a. m.

Gordon Jones, 40, was found by neighbors wandering, dazed and burned, outside the house.

The blaze levelled the house on the Jones homestead, 10 miles north of this village. At mid-day police had recovered four of the bodies and were sifting the ashes for the remaining three.

The toll raised the number of fire deaths in Canada since Nov. 1 to 180. In Ontario alone, 85 persons have lost their lives in fires.

In Toronto the Ontario fire marshal's office said it has been called in to investigate the fire.

Mr. Jones, serving his seventh term as councillor for Marmora and Lake township, underwent surgery for three hours in hospital at Peterborough. Doctors said he has burns over 35 per cent of his body. His condition was described as serious.

**PRONE IN SNOW**  
The first neighbor to arrive at the fire was Wilbert Jones, a cousin of the injured man. He found the father slumped across a snow-covered laneway.

"They're all in there, all in the fire," Jones screamed. "It was an inferno... I tried and tried to get back inside but it was too hot."

Wilbert Jones said he first saw the fire from a window of his house, about a half-mile away from his cousin's home. He placed the time at 8:30 a. m.

He said he hurried over to find the building "a roaring mass of flames. I was the first on the scene but... the others began arriving and I had to force them back."

Phyllis, oldest of the six children who perished, had returned home the night before to visit her parents. She had been living in Marmora where she was employed.
