Newfoundland riding in the next election, expected in August.

In the latter event he would presumably succeed Hon. F. C. Bradley, secretary of state and Newfoundland's representative in the cabinet. Mr. Bradley is believed slated for the Senate.

Those who could give the answer—Mr. Pickersgill and Prime Minister St. Laurent—were not talking.

Some months ago when it was reported Mr. Pickersgill would give up his \$15,000-a-year civil service job and run in a Manitoba riding, he promptly denied that he had any plans to enter politics.

Close To Prime Ministers
From 1937, when he entered the external affairs department, Mr. Pickersgill has been closely associated with direction of affairs in the office of the prime minister.

For the last 10 years of office of the late Prime Minister Mackenzie King, Mr. Pickersgill was his secretary and close adviser. He continued in that capacity when Prime Minister St. Laurent took over in 1948 until he was appointed as clerk of the Privy Council and secretary to the cabinet in June, 1952.

In the latter post Mr. Pickersgill has travelled a great deal with the prime minister, including tours through Canada, to London and last week's visit to Washington.

Some Criticism
This activity brought some criticism in the Commons from members who said Mr. Pickersgill in his role as clerk of the Privy Council, is too closely connected with what might be political activities of the prime minister.

Mr. St. Laurent denied the political activity and said he had taken Mr. Pickersgill on certain tours because of the necessity of constant liaison with cabinet affairs.
