OUR CAPITAL ACCOUNT.

THE EXAMINER has been asked by a farmer to state "when the Government of this province opened a capital account." In reply, we may say that a capital account has not yet been properly opened. What is called "a capital account" was first set forth in the Provincial Auditor's Report for 1892. Previous to that year all expenditures of the Government were classed together under one head. The Conservatives when in office received no credit from the Liberals for any of their expenditures upon permanent works. If their total receipts did not equal their total expenditures they were denounced for making a deficit and "running the country into debt." It will be remembered that the Liberals came in pledged, above all things, to make ends meet. But they didn't do so. The pledge was fresh in the minds of the people in 1891 and 1892. So when deficit succeeded deficit the Liberals thought of "a capital account" as a means of "letting themselves down easy" so that they might not fall too heavily in the estimation of the public. A few expenditures were then "specially selected" and classified under the heading of "Expenditure on Capital Account,"—and ever since we have had our "Capital Account," so-called. But it is really as much a capital account as the sinking fund "on call" at the banks is really a sinking fund. One can hardly call it a fraud—it is only an incident in the system of humbug which has lately been inaugurated. A Capital Account, properly kept, would be a capital good thing, inasmuch as it would show how our capital is being dissipated, and how the public is being fleeced. We know, of course, that the Land Office has been literally ruined, that thousands upon thousands of dollars worth of the capital of the province have been thrown away in a scandalous and successful effort to keep the Liberals in office. But we don't know where the money went, or exactly how much has been squandered. A Capital Account, properly kept, would have been an eye-opener for the public in this regard,—and the pity is that we have not had such an account.

In this connection, we may remark that the details of expenditure by warrant, formerly included in the Provincial Auditor's Report, have been suppressed by the Liberals. This is another check removed. If, in the olden time, a contractor actually received \$60 for a piece of work and the accounts showed that he had received \$68 the fact could easily be noted by the people's representatives and an explanation demanded; but now that the record of the warrants has been stopped, it is much more difficult to discover where the difference goes.

—The St. John Sun says that "Members of parliament have some good ground for believing that, under the existing order of things, they should receive extra indemnity for the long session. But why not revise the indemnity law? Instead of paying them selves one thousand dollars per session, the members might enact that for a session of three months or less they shall receive \$1,500; for a session lasting for four months, \$1,250, and for a session exceeding that limit only one thousand dollars. There will be less talking and more work, and, with this schedule in operation, no government would dare call parliament together until it was prepared for business. The members would be better paid, but the country would save big money by this plan.

But the Patriot's hen still lives and continues to cackle over its one success in a Liberal district!
