Three Prominent Golfers Are Fined

AUGUSTA, Ga., (AP)—The tournament committee of the Professional Golfers Association Wednesday fined three prominent golfers and put one of them on six months' probation as the aftermath of a "rhubarb" in the Greensboro Open tournament last week-end.

Marty Furgol of Lemont, Ill., was fined \$250 and put on probation for six months. Doug Ford of Yonkers, N. Y., who beat Furgol in a play-off for first place in the tournament, and Bill Nary of Tucson, Ariz., were fined \$50 each.

This almost unprecedented public chastisement of prominent touring pros resulted from a dispute between Nary and Ford. Nary claimed that Ford had stepped on a bush to hold it out of the way while he was making a shot and he refused to sign Ford's card. Furgol then got into the dispute which almost led to blows.

Queen approves medal for air force shooting

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Queen has approved a medal to encourage small-arms shooting skill in the Commonwealth air force, and Canadians will compete for it at nearby Connaught ranges this summer.

The Queen's medal for champion shots of the air forces, will be up for competition at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association Aug. 11. The RCAF announced Wednesday. To be eligible, competitors must be members of the RCAF regular force or active members of the auxiliary or primary reserve.

Made of silver, the medal is circular and bears the crowned effigy of the Queen on one side. The reverse side will have the inscription: "The Queen's medal for champion shots of the air forces", with a representation of Hermes throwing a javelin and mounted on a hawk in flight. The recipient's name will be engraved on the rim of the medal. The ribbon accompanying the award is crimson with three vertical strips of dark blue, light blue and dark blue.

Participants will use service rifles without slings and fire 40 rounds in four phases: deliberate fire at 600 yards, fire with movement at distances ranging from 100 to 600 yards, rapid fire at 300 yards and snaphooting at 300 yards.

Injury Postpones Moore-Slade Bout

WASHINGTON, (AP)—An injury to a horse in the left foot of Archie Moore, world light-heavyweight boxing champion, has forced postponement of his 10-round non-title bout with Jimmy Slade. The bout, originally set for April 14, now will be held May 12.

Ottawa Team Wins Memorial Cup Series From Sydney

OTTAWA, (CP)—Eastview St. Charles Wednesday night eliminated North Sydney Franklins in the eastern Canada Memorial Cup quarter-finals with a 6-2 win in the deciding game of their best-of-five series.

Referee Ken Mullins called a halt to the game with 32 seconds remaining as Eastview hammered in their sixth goal when a fight broke out in the North Sydney end. Players from both teams joined in the fray and Mullins stopped the game as fans poured onto the ice.

The win earned the Ottawa and District champions the right to advance into the semi-finals against Quebec Frontenacs. The first game of the series will be played here Friday night.

After the game, however, W. B. George, president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, said North Sydney would have 24 hours in which to file a protest over the game being called off before the final bell. Mr. George, who watched the game, said Franklins had indicated they would file a protest.

Hugh Garneau and Ovilva Benoit scored two goals each for the winners, while singles came from Floyd Smith and Harry Robinson. Sterling McClure and Jack MacLeod counted for the losers.

St. Charles outplayed, outclassed an outshot the Maritime champions throughout. Only the good netminding of goalie Jack Mongeon kept Eastview from building up a wider margin.

The fight broke out between Eastview's Earl Powell and North Sydney's Coke Grady. Then other players from both teams joined in and the fans streamed onto the ice.

Pearson Comments On Hydrogen Bomb

OTTAWA, (CP)—External Affairs Minister Pearson said Tuesday it would be unwise for Canada to ask the United States to call off hydrogen bomb tests in the Pacific.

He told the Commons external affairs committee that Canada has made known to Washington its anxiety about the tests and has asked for all possible information on effects of the explosions and plans for further tests.

"If we can take any comfort, it is the knowledge that the bomb is not exclusively in the hands of the other side," Mr. Pearson said.

Mr. Pearson said he expects Canada will take part in private discussions with Britain, the United States and Russia on international control of atomic energy.

He said the three powers now are considering re-assembly of the United Nations disarmament commission. It was felt that the best chance for progress in the commission was first to hold private discussions on procedure to be followed.

Canadiens Have All Injuries As Series Shift To Montreal

MONTREAL, (CP)—Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings, their best-of-seven Stanley Cup final all square at a game apiece, arrived in Montreal early Wednesday night and the casualties were all in Canadiens' special car.

The worst of the Montreal crew was defenceman Doug Harvey, on the limp from a twisted knee. He was classed at least as a doubtful starter for the third game of the series tonight.

Jean Beliveau, the big rookie centre who has been hitting his stride in the playoffs, came out of Montreal's 3-1 win in Detroit Tuesday night with a charley-horse.

The lesser casualties were Paul Meger and Dollard St. Laurent, both of whom missed the second game in Detroit. Meger has a knee injury and St. Laurent a sprained wrist.

Harvey, Beliveau and Meger were ordered to the Forum clinic tonight for treatment and final decision on their chances of playing will likely not be known until today.

The Red Wings were more fortunate. Coach Tommy Ivan reported all hands okay. Ivan said he anticipated no changes in his lineup and if any are made they will be minor.

Montreal coach Dick Irvin declined to commit himself but indicated his revamped lines will again work in that manner tonight.

The big shift came at the start of Tuesday night's game when Rocket Richard was teamed up with Paul Masnick and Eddie Mazur. The line worked well although Richard's two goals came when he was the extra forward on power plays with another line—Beliveau, Dickie Moore and Boom Boom Geoffrion.

The change sent Ken Modell and Bert Olmstead to the lines and sometimes they were switched about.
