

Local and Other Items.

FROM BOSTON.—The schr. Katie, Captain Townsend, arrived from Boston to-day with a cargo consisting of 5,140 bushels corn for Geo. E. Fall; 300 brls. flour for J. H. Myrick & Co., and 18 pieces pitch pine for Captain R. McMillan.

FIRE.—We regret to hear that the dwelling house, shop, warehouse and stable of Mr. A. Macdonald, at Millview, was destroyed by fire on Saturday. The fire started about ten o'clock in the stable. All the goods and furniture were saved. The origin of the fire is unknown. Mr. Macdonald was insured for \$400.

THE CARAVELS.—The Spanish caravels, Santa Maria, Nina and Pinta, in tow of the U. S. steamers Triton and Iwara, passed through the Straits of Canoe on Saturday. They were sighted off Halifax harbor at one o'clock on Friday afternoon, and there was considerable disappointment because they did not come up the harbor and "lay to," as was expected.

The bride is nineteen years and the groom is more advanced in years and profits by the experience of some sixty summers which he has seen fade into autumn. The happy couple were the recipients of a number of handsome presents.

NOTES OF SHIPPING.—The schooner Brudenell, owned by Hon. D. Gordon, Georgetown, now in this port, is just at the end of an interesting trading voyage. She left Halifax, November 25th 1892; went to Sheet Harbor, to St. John's Nfld., to Havant, to Apalachicola, to Batabanona in the Gulf of Esenado de la Bro, to Philadelphia and to Halifax.

There is considerable competition among shipmasters for the captaincy of the Boston steamer Britannia, which shortly commences running to this port and P. E. Island. Captain Hanson, of the Worcester, is an applicant.—Halifax Herald.

BLACK MAN TURNING WHITE.—A colored man, whose case is an interesting one, recently presented himself at the Montreal hospital for treatment. A student at McGill, writing to a friend in St. John, says: "The patient is a man about 45 or 50 years of age, was black from his upper lip to the top of his head. The rest of his face was white. His hands also were white; also other parts of his body. He said that until about seven years ago he was black all over, but at that time noticed his hands and face were becoming white. Since then the change has been gradually going on. You cannot imagine what a queer looking character he is. His lips are thick and his hair has the regulation curl. When he has his hat on, the black part of his face looks like a shadow thrown by the rim of it."
