All But Four Streets In Souris Are Clogged

SOURIS — All roads in the Souris area were reported open last evening, although deep cuttings and narrow passages made travelling still difficult. Cuttings were said to be close to 20 feet deep in some places. Streets in the town, with the exception of four main streets serviced by provincial government plows, are still plugged. The town plow is out of action and is not expected to be repaired for another three days.

A plow borrowed from a Charlottetown firm began working on the blocked streets last night, and it was thought the streets would be cleared some time today.

The clogged streets have proved inconvenient to many householders who have been running low on fuel. Because of road conditions, the regularly scheduled court session was adjourned by the crew Moutant J.P., clerk of the

15,000 Are Added To Hospital Insured

The addition of 15,000 Island residents to those entitled to insured hospital services in 1963, and the rapidly increasing costs of maintaining hospital care in the past few years are emphasized in an interim report of the Hospital Services Commission tabled in the legislature here yesterday by Health Minister H.E. McNeill.

Shareable costs for all Prince Edward Island hospitals increased from \$1,960,588.78 in 1962 to \$2,470,654 in 1963, it is revealed.

The estimated 15,000 additional people who will be insured, now that premiums are paid out of general revenue, is based on the present number of insured patients—there were 28,000 at the end of December as compared to the approximate 108,000 of population.

Salaries increased from \$1,062,785 to \$1,726,609, drugs, medical and surgical supplies from \$170,664 to \$277,800, dietary expenses from \$93,385 to \$277,685 and plant operation from \$16,417 to \$148,586, to mention a few of the larger items.

Commenting on the increased costs Dr. L.E. Prowse, chairman of the commission, observed, "as our hospital staffs and insured services are now assured, a desirable standard." The costs will eventually level out pretty well, though he foresees further increases in the next year or so.

"While the increased costs of 1963 over the previous year are

related mainly to increased salaries and increased services in our hospitals, there has been the added factor of increased utilization (hospital usage) of both in-patient and out-patient services. With an increased number of residents entitled to insurance in 1963 because of the abolition of hospital insurance premiums we can expect a further increase in utilization during the next few years," Dr. Prowse estimates.

The party's objective will be to determine by seismic methods the depth, shape and other features of the sedimentary basin under the bay's relatively shallow waters. It is the last unexplored sedimentary basin in North America.

Dr. L. W. Morley, chief of the geophysics division of the Geological Survey of Canada left Wednesday for a risky oil-hunting expedition on the dangerous ice fields of Hudson Bay.

The team, headed by 40-year-old George Hobson, a federal geophysicist, will face two main dangers during the five weeks it will spend on the huge shifting, crunching ice pans of the bay to a distance of 300 miles from shore.

The main danger will be from pressure ridges or toe walls, rises suddenly and silently to heights of up to 40 feet. The second will be from polar bears which infest the ice fields and consider anything that moves edible.

This will be the first time any survey party has attempted to work on the ice in Hudson Bay.

"If the basin is as thick as we think it is, it could very well contain oil," he said.

Data Given On Salaries For Teachers

Fifty-three teachers with Superior 4 license ratings drew average salaries of \$5,153.58 in the school year ending June 30, 1962, according to a report tabled by Education Minister L.G. Dewar yesterday in the provincial legislature.

The 23 with Superior 3 rating received average payment of \$4,008.70. The 46 with Superior 2 licenses received an average of \$3,856.78, and an even 100 Superior 1 license holders were paid an average of \$3,491 each.

The 176 First Class 5 teachers drew \$2,515.60 and the 266 Second class licensees drew an average salary of \$2,365.37.

There were 10 third class teachers who were paid \$1,676.60 and 35 permit teachers who drew an average of \$1,574.24, the report reveals.

Old Bridge Account Settled

Highways Minister Phillip Matheson announced the Legislature yesterday that his department has received a \$20,000 cheque from the federal government which he said was in settlement of the old Hillsboro Bridge account.

Since the early 1930's, the province has been keeping the bridge in repair and has paid an annual rental fee to the federal government of \$9,750.

Mr. Matheson said this province now owns the old bridge. Recently he said tenders would be called for the dismantling of the structure.
