DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

THE CHARGES AGAINST CARON

OTTAWA, April 21. The Premier states that a Grit story that the Governor General has intervened in the matter of the charges against Caron and insists on an investigation is wholly false. The Government adheres to the John Thompson's statement made in the House, that if Edgar will formulate specific charges an enquiry will be granted. It is stated that Sir John Macdonald had decided to make Mackenzie senator if defeated for the Commons at the next election. A correspondent of the Ottawa Citizen suggests that the Government should pension Mrs. McKenzie.

Hon. Alex. McKenzie's Funeral.

TORONTO, April 21. The funeral of the late Hon. Alex. McKenzie took place yesterday. There was general mourning throughout the city. The services were held at the Baptist Church. The pall bearers were the Hon. Oliver Mowat, Judge Burton, Hon. Edward Blake, G. W. Allan, G. W. Ross, Judge Maclellan, Sir Richard Cartwright, T. W. Anglin, J. L. Blakie, Robert J. Hay, T. C. Irving and Major Gregg. Amongst those present were Sir John Thompson, Hon. McKenzie's Bowell, Hon. T. C. Patterson, Hon. Wilfred Laurier, Hon. David Mills. The three former represent the Dominion Cabinet and two latter the Liberal Party. The body was taken to Sarnia where it will be buried to-day.

Mercier Arrested.

MONTREAL, April 21. The blow has at length fallen and Count Mercier and his bosom friend Picaud are in the hands of justice. Yesterday High Constable Gale, of Quebec, arrived in the city and proceeded at once to the ex-Premier's residence and placed the Count under arrest. They are charging with conspiring together and obtaining some sixty thousand dollars of money of the Queen and against the peace of the Queen, Her Crown and dignity.

Powder Mills Blown Up.

NEWARK, N. J., April 21. Hector Deacon's Co's powder mill blew up yesterday, killing ten men. Among them is Superintendent Smith, who was in charge of the building.

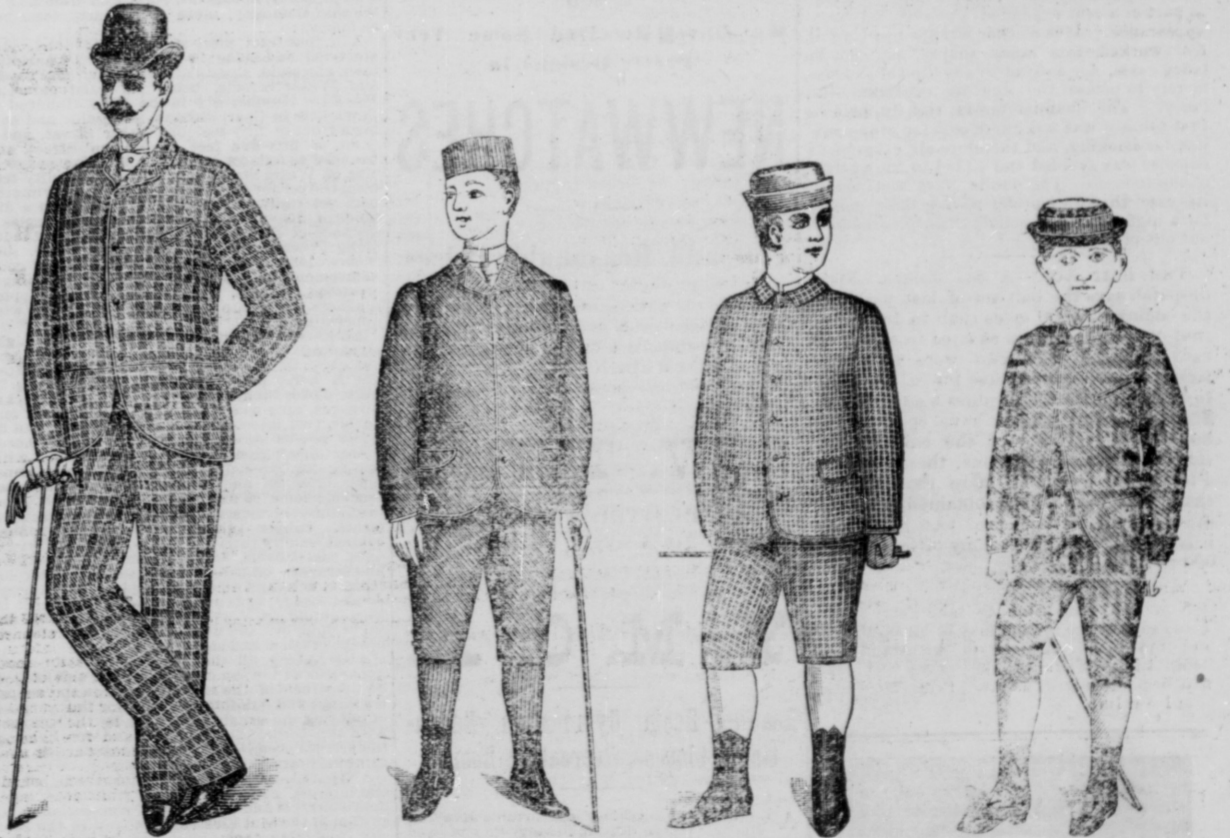
