

Thirteen American fishing vessels are said to be ashore on Cape Breton, near Port Hood.—Many others that rode out the gale have suffered the loss of rigging, chains and anchors. A fishing vessel belonging to Portland, Me., is said to have been totally lost with all hands, fourteen in number.

The Packet Boat Princess Victoria, from St. John, N. F. with the Mails for Harbour Grace, Conception Bay, and the Cove, is reported to be totally lost, with all her crew, &c.

The Viceroy from Quebec for Liverpool, was totally lost on Saint Paul's Island on Monday last; crew saved.
