DAIRY PRODUCE

Cheese Steady and Butter Dull and Heavy.

The Montreal Gazette reports "the market was steady in tone, the chief business being the transaction at the wharf, where 7,000 boxes were sold at a range of 11 1/2c to 11 3/4c, the inside being the ruling price. Business between traders was fairly active; also dealing being noted in eastern goods at 11 5/8c to 11 3/4c, the inside for the fancy goods, while western cheese were nominal. Receipts of butter were 1,941 pkgs. The market was dull and heavy in its tone. Trading in creamery in an export way is light and prices range from 22 1/2 to 23, as to grade, while western dairy is quoted from 17 to 17 1/2c. In a local jobbing way business is light.

GRAIN

Little Doing—Markets Firm.

Business over the cable in grain of all kinds was again quiet, as bids were entirely out of line, owing principally to a further advance in ocean grain freights, which is due to the withdrawal of a number of vessels, as they have been chartered by the English Government. There was very little doing in coarse grains on spot, but the tone of the market is firm.

Oats in Montreal sell at 30 to 30 1/2 cents per bushel. In Charlottetown dealers are offering 27 cents per bushel for oats.

To Extract a Splinter.

The easiest way to extract a splinter deep in the flesh of the hand or foot is by means of steam. A rather wide mouthed bottle is filled two-thirds full of boiling water, and the injured spot is held close over the opening. The suction draws the flesh down, and a little additional pressure is used to assist the exit of the intruder. In a few moments the steam extracts the splinter, and the inflammation rapidly subsides.

Glove Silver.

Glove silver was the strange name given to a custom which prevailed in England during the middle ages—namely, the granting of a certain sum of money to servants to buy gloves with on Lammas day, or, as it is called now, Bank holiday.

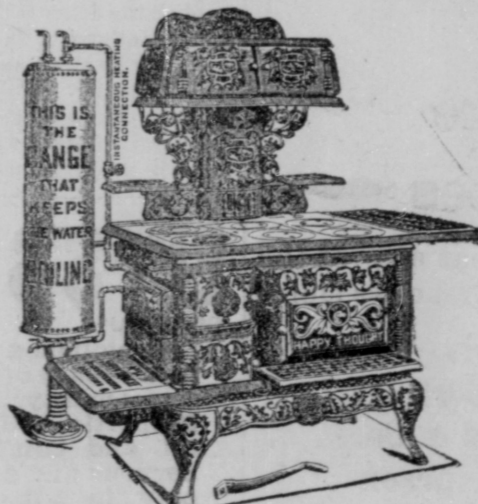
