

ONCE LECTURED AS FLIER

Masquerades in Kansas

SAINT JOHN (CP) — Calvin Laskey, convicted in Kansas of masquerading as a minister, watched the glorious 20s and early 30s pass by from inside an orphanage, a reform school and the poorhouse here.

Neither his natural parents nor his exact birth-date are known. He became a ward of the Children's Aid Society here in 1920 after being abandoned by his foster parents. They estimated his age at six.

Today, approximately 43, Laskey is serving a six-month term for illegally marrying a couple while posing as a minister, a climaxing a career that turned him from a "model" founding a thief and grand larcenist.

Welfare agency records dating back 36 years were opened to the public for the first time Friday to reveal a pathetic story of an unwanted youth once given shelter in the local poor house "so he could have food and lodging while continuing his studies."

LIVED IN ORPHANAGE

He remained in Saint John for 15 years, some of which are unaccounted for in the records. Unfortunates of 1928 — except for three months spent with a farm family who returned him complaining of his "ly-1945 after he toured hospitals and ing and stealing." Laskey lived in an orphanage.

He was sentenced to three years and 10 months in the Boys' Indus trial Home in 1928 and in 1934 was sent to live in the Municipal Home "poor house", presumably because his 21 years made him overage for the orphanage.

Dock Union Leaders In Split On Peace Offer

NEW YORK (AP)—Dock union leaders split in anger Friday over terms for ending a four-day east coast waterfront strike. Their falling out stalled any progress toward settlement.

The leaders of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA) have been trying for two days to decide whether to take a final peace offer from the shippers.

TO COOL OFF

Twice a faction opposed to the peace terms stormed angrily out of the ILA caucus Friday. It finally was adjourned until Saturday without a final decision.

"A cooling off will be good for them," said ILA counsel Louis Waldman of the overnight adjournment.

Meanwhile, negotiators for the 170-member New York Shippers Association cooled their heels for a second day, awaiting the ILA's decision.

The shippers made what they termed their final contract offer to the ILA in mid-afternoon Thursday. Since then the union's 125-man wage scale committee has been deadlocked over the proposal.

PISTOL LOCAL BALKS

ILA president William V. Bradley and Brooklyn dock boss Anthony (Tough Tony) Anastasia were believed willing to accept the peace terms and end the strike.

But west side Manhattan union chiefs—including leaders of Pistol Local 824—were holding out for further concessions from the shippers.

Twice the latter faction marched out of the caucus and headed for the elevators. Twice they were persuaded to return.

They were angered by a caucus vote in favor of re-evaluating the peace offer item by item.

The walkouts were led by Harold Bowers, business agent of the strike.

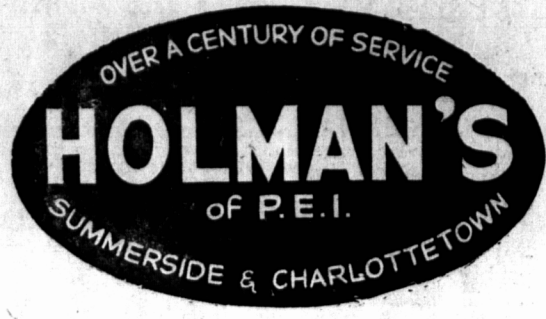
