THE receipts of the Intercolonial Railway for the month of October last amounted to \$182,765, being an increase of \$15,741 over the corresponding month of last year. For the four months ending October 31st, there was an increase of \$75,139 over the same months of last year, which in their turn showed an enormous increase over the same months of 1879.

RETURNING NEW BRUNSWICKERS.—On Thursday night there returned from Ohio 37 Acadians, who left Memramcook, Belliveau Village and adjacent parts in the spring to work in the western quarries. During the summer three of the fifty who went died, and the rest will return home soon. The returned party reported they had to work hard, but have sent or brought home from \$150 to \$200 each, in cash, or over \$5,000 among them. They went by rail to Memramcook yesterday.—Sun.

THE ship Eugenie was not as seriously damaged as reported yesterday. She fouled the railway wharf, and a small portion of her bow was torn away. The repairs will not cost fifty dollars. A correspondent regarding the drowning of Mr. Mitchell, says: "The particulars of the sad event are but partially known. Mitchell was in the act of freeing the anchor which had caught in the chains. The ship then lurched, and he fell into the sea. The deceased is spoken of as a smart, industrious man."

THE MAGDALEN ISLAND FLEET.—Information was received by telegraph in this city yesterday, that the schooners "Arctic" and "Marie Ephrasyme," and five other schooners of the Magdalen Island fleet were ashore at Amherst, M. I. The vessel numbering 18 schooners, with the winter supplies for the island, left this port between the 15th and the 19th inst., and were at Port Hawkesbury together on their way home. It is expected that the vessels will not be much damaged, as the place where they went on shore is a sandy bottom. If the cargoes of the vessels are lost, it will be necessary to send supplies to the islands immediately before the ice sets in. The schooner "Flash" which left Quebec some time ago for the Magdalen with a cargo of flour and provisions, and was reported missing, is given up for lost.—Hc. Herald.

DECEITFUL THE REVENUE.—Yesterday afternoon Mr. Grant, acting Collector of Inland Revenue, and Patrick Hagarty, of the department, made a seizure of an illicit still in a building on Hamilton's Wharf. The room in which the work was carried on is on the second story of the building in the rear of the liquor store at the head of the wharf. Some time ago the suspicion of one of the officers of the department was aroused, and a search of the premises was made, but at that time no traces of a still could be found. Yesterday a cask of liquor was shipped from the place for P. E. Island, and while it was being trucked to a vessel lying at one of the wharves, it was seized, and officers were immediately sent to the place to search. It is the custom in such business to have one of the parties interested follow the truck carrying the liquor, and see it safe at its destination; and as soon as the seizure was made, this individual returned and warned those at work in the "mill." When the officers arrived at the scene of operation, the still was found in full blast but the birds had flown. There were ten or twelve puncheons of wash in the room, and the usual machinery for making the liquor, with a boiler having a capacity of about twenty-eight gallons.—Hc. Herald.

It is stated that Mr. Jos. Lewis an English Mechanical Engineer, now in Montreal, has invented a new style of locomotive of much simpler character than those now in use that will run at a higher rate of speed and with the greatest steadiness and safety.
A secret printing office with hand-presses has just been discovered at Vasilidistrow, a faubourg of St. Petersburg. Six persons including a woman, were captured, and next day several university students were arrested. The "Holy Cohort" has been dissolved by imperial order.

To All Whom it May Concern.

THE undersigned having been appointed, Inspector of Leather and of Raw Hides for the Division of Charlottetown, which comprises the whole of Prince Edward Island, notice is hereby given that on and after this date I will be prepared to examine and inspect all Raw Hides and Leather, at the Shop formerly occupied by David Wilson, Esq., Richmond Street, opposite London House.

Special attention is called to the 96th and 97th sections of the General Inspection Act 1874, which are as follows:—
96. The Inspection of Raw Hides shall be compulsory at every place where an Inspector or Deputy Inspector has been appointed; and every Raw Hide sold, offered for sale or exported, offered for export or laden in any vehicle or vessel for the purpose of being exported, and which has not been first inspected and stamped or marked as herein required, shall be forfeited; and the person so selling or offering for sale or exporting the same, shall incur a penalty of one dollar for every Hide so sold, offered for sale, or exported.
97. The expression "Raw Hides" shall mean and include all untanned or uncurried skins commonly used in the manufacture of Leather.

MORE LIGHT!
