Angus MacLean Is Busy With Three Portfolios

OTTAWA — Fisheries Minister Angus MacLean is one of the busiest men in Ottawa, for the past several days he has been holding down three portfolios, two of them on an acting basis.

He remains in his own post as minister of fisheries. A week ago Prime Minister Diefenbaker appointed him as acting postmaster general. William Hamilton, who was postmaster general for the past several years, was defeated in his bid for reelection in his Montreal riding. Mr. MacLean has since assumed the title of acting minister of fisheries.

Mr. MacLean is handling most of his duties from his own fisheries ministry office with occasional visits to the postmaster general's office. Deputy ministers and officials from the other two departments consult him by telephone and by personal visit. Fortunately, the duties are not too onerous so far and consist largely of signing documents. No major decisions affecting either of the other two departments are likely to be made in the next few weeks.
