READING, AGAIN

Reading has become a matter of vital importance to the entire community. The teacher can no longer be held solely responsible for the reading skills and habits of our young people.

For example, it was possible in the not distant past for a man to leave school in grade 5, and still become a successful and public spirited citizen.

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There are, for example, simple devices in a home to give a child greater awareness of the world of books.

Librarians can be invited to speak before Home and School Organizations. They can pass out book lists and suggest ways of interesting the child in the books.

There are probably remote rural communities where there is no travelling library can be installed.

In many homes of older folks there are fine children's classics gathering dust. Older pupils can be encouraged to canvass homes and collect and distribute such books where there are no libraries or book shops.

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Is Given 5-Year Prison Sentence

HALIFAX (CP) — Hector Duhamel, 48, of Montreal was sentenced in county court Monday to five years in Dorchester penitentiary on each of six counts of forging government bonds valued at \$8,500.

Duhamel, alias Marcel Hall, was arrested in Cornwall, Ont., and returned here to face charges June 7 after the bonds turned up at six local banks.

Police said the bonds were part of the \$250,000 loot taken from the Bank of Nova Scotia branch at Maxville, Ont., Nov. 11, 1948. Thieves entered the bank through a washroom window and cut their way through a 2 1/2-ton steel door to reach safety deposit boxes.

6 KILLED IN MINE
CAPETOWN (Reuters) — Five Africans and one white miner were killed and 22 Africans injured in a pressure burst in a shaft of the crown mines here Thursday, the directors announced. Rescuers searched Friday for two Africans still missing.

From the Guardian, Sept. 16th, 1952: "An ideal autumn day, a good card of races, the unique attraction of the biplane, drew a record attendance at the Exhibition Grounds yesterday. The grandstand was packed and full of 2,000 people lined the fences and the centre of the track to view the sport. Capt. Baldwin with his air ship was the chief centre of interest, the audience being intensely occupied in watching his splendid flight. Without any fuss, and very little preparation, he gracefully ascended into the sky, circling an area in full view of the grandstand several times, then alighting in almost the exact spot in which he had started. His feat brought a great tribute of applause from the spectators with whom he is a favorite because of his pluck and modesty. AGRICULTURAL NEWS
P. E. I. Department of Agriculture

HARVEST EXHIBITION
Approximately seven hundred exhibits have been entered by well over one hundred exhibitors. This is the first Harvest Exhibition in many years, looks-as if it is going to be an outstanding showing of P.E.I. products.
In order to give some idea of the number entered in the various classes here are a few selected at random—Bush beans, round wax pods (10); Beets (26) (14); Cabbage (10) Carrots (20); Corn sweet (13); Cucumbers (7); Lettuce (12); Onions (19); Parsnips (10); Pumpkins (10); Tomatoes green (30); Collection of garden vegetables six entries.
The fruit classes are generally light as to the number of entries. Potatoes, Certified Seed have approximately sixty entries. Irish Cobbler (20); Green Mountain (2); Sebago (25); Katahdin (2); any other white variety (7); Colored (2). In the Table Stock Potato Classes, Early (20); and Intermediate and Late varieties. (28).
In class five, Field Crop Seeds there are over sixty entries, with late oats heading the list with 20 entries and early oats with 10 entries. In Class six, Field Roots, the entries are as follows: Commercial Table Swedes (30); Swedes for stock feed (7); Mangels (20).
The Dairyman's Special, which has been put up by the P.E.I. Dairyman's Association for hay and Silage, have ten and five entries respectively.

WINTER FAIR
The 43rd annual Maritime Winter Fair, under the auspices of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association, will be held this year from October 27th to November 3rd. The interest which is being shown in the three Provinces seem to indicate that this year's show will be one of the largest in its long history. In addition to the livestock, horticultural and other crops there will be many exhibits and new innovations.
