Contract Bridge

HIS OWN ENEMY

The bidding:
 North East South West

Alter South found out, via Blackwood, that North had three aces, he was quite right in contracting for the grand slam at clubs. It isn't often that a player has such a suit opposite an opening bro-bid!
 The opening lead was the seven of diamonds. Dummy's ace was of course put up; then South cashed the heart ace and ruffed a low heart with a low trump. He then ran off six more trump tricks, until his own hand was reduced to two spades, one diamond and one trump, while dummy still had the A-Q of spades and the K-10 of hearts.
 West still had two spades, the singleton jack of hearts, and the queen of diamonds, while East had kept the K-5 of spades, the heart Queen and the diamond king.
 South cashed his last trump, and West discarded a spade. Obviously, the contract could have been made easily, by declarer's discarding the spade queen from dummy and keeping both hearts, but how was South to know that? Mathematically, there was more chance for the spade finesse than for a heart break, and so South discarded the heart ten and tried the spade finesse. Down one!

It is quite true that any plan declarer used carried risk, but perhaps the first choice South could make was to leave himself with a guess. Thus, everything considered, he should have cashed both high hearts immediately and ruffed a heart with an honor as an outright test. Now South would know what was what in the heart suit and could guide himself accordingly.

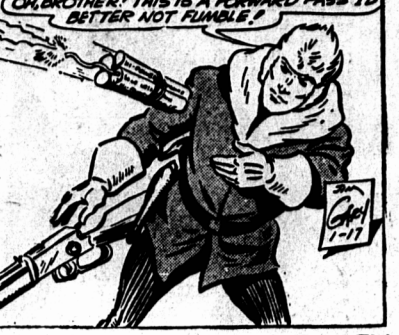

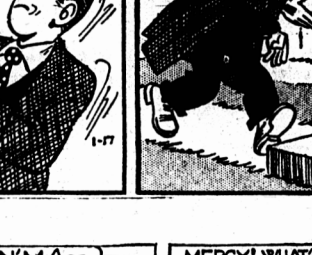

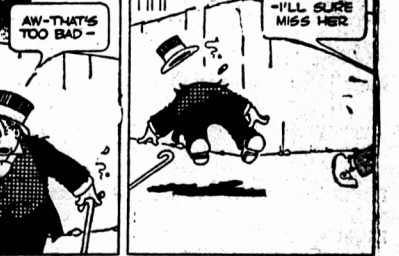
