

Research Council Said Not Involved

 OTTAWA — While announcement has been made that three firms of consulting engineers have been engaged to work with the federal government on the P.E.I. Causeway project, the National Research Council has not yet been advised whether it will conduct any further studies of the engineering problems involved in the Prince Edward Island causeway.
 The NRC set up a scale model of cross-section of the causeway several years ago and ran some extensive tests. Purpose was to find out the effect of waves on the rock sides of the causeway. A report on this work was forwarded to the department of public works.
 A spokesman for NRC said that he did not know if the council will be called back to check on further engineering problems.
 He said there was still a great deal of work to be done on the effect of tides and on the construction of the causeway, which would be a tricky matter because of the varying heads of

Intoxicated Driving Charge, 2 Speeding Cases Adjudged

Charged with driving while intoxicated, Hensley Frizell, Brackley Point Road, pleaded guilty and following the testimony of two police officers was remanded until June 29 by Magistrate A.J. Haslam in city police court yesterday. Defence counsel is John P. Nicholson.
 Charged with speeding Elwyn J. MacEwen, Southport, did not appear himself, and was represented by a friend. Following the hearing of the testimony of Const. Harley Ince, Paradise police officer, the magistrate said that under the circumstances the accused should be in court.
FORCED TO JUMP
 One Ince stated that he had clocked the accused at 33 m.p.h., travelling west on Fitzroy Street, between Cumberland and Hillsboro. At the time, school children were on their way home, and at the intersection of Fitzroy and Weymouth Streets, the accused did not stop for the "stop" sign, and as he traversed the intersection, some children who were crossing were forced to jump back out of the path of the accused's car.
 The magistrate then adjourned the case until June 19, remarking that from the evidence it was apparent that the case appeared to be more than just one of speeding.
 Donald Joseph Ross, M. Stewart, also charged with speeding, failed to appear in answer to a summons and the magistrate ordered that a warrant for his arrest be issued.
 Arraigned by counsel, Mr. Nicholson for the defence and Miss K. Scobie for the prosecution, was completed in the case of Milton Ernest Bennet, Charlottetown, and the accused was then remanded for a decision until June 20.
 Bennet is charged with assaulting Adriane Blagode, causing actual bodily harm.

Kickham Attacks Tory Gov't At Public Meeting In Souris

SOURIS — A crowded St. Mary's Hall here witnessed the final public meeting of the election campaign in Kings for Liberal candidate Thomas J. Kickham on Thursday night. Close to 500 people from all parts of the First District heard Mr. Kickham, Dr. L. M. Bonnell, M.L.A., W. A. Acra and John Mullally present the issues of the current campaign as they affect Canada generally and Kings particularly.
 Major Reid, president of the Kings County Liberal Association presided.
 In his last public appearance in the campaign, Mr. Kickham said that every indication points to a Liberal victory being returned to office on June 18. He made a vigorous attack on the fiscal and monetary policies of the Conservative government and the serious condition of the economy. He argued that Canadians have no choice, if they have their country's welfare in mind, but to defeat the Conservatives on Monday and return Liberal government.
 Mr. Kickham also attacked what he called the outright disregard of the Tory government for the welfare of farmers, fishermen and working people. He said "that not only has Mr. Diefenbaker not kept his promise of 1957 and 1958 but he has not even kept his promise made to our potato growers in Charlottetown but a few weeks ago."
 "How can the Canadian people trust such a man with the affairs of the country?" he concluded.
 Dr. Bonnell presented a very clear analysis of the effect of the dollar devaluation on Canadians everywhere. He also outlined details of the new Liberal medical care plan which, he said, would be worked out in detail by the federal and provincial governments, together with the Canadian Medical Association.
 Mr. Acra quoted numerous newspapers which he said previously supported the Conservatives but which have now changed their support to the Liberal party.
