

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

THE CITY COURT was in session this forenoon.

JOURNALISM.—The New Glasgow Enterprise comes to hand this morning enlarged to eight pages and otherwise improved.

POLICE COURT.—The forenoon case against Philip Curley, charged with selling liquor to an Indian, was concluded. The summons was dismissed.

CORREY COURTS.—The August term of the County Courts for the three Counties opens to-morrow (Tuesday) at Eldon, Souris and Alberton respectively.

FOR THE IRISH CAUSE.—James McShane, President of the Montreal St. Patrick's Society, has sent £210 sterling to Edward Blake for the Home Rule fund from his society.

THE TURF.—There will be three days racing on the Amherst Driving Park, commencing August 23rd. There will be six races, for which purses amounting to \$2,400 are offered.

NECESSARY IMPROVEMENTS.—The Town Council are considering an offer to provide the town with more electric lights on the streets, and also an electric fire alarm system.

SOME MONEY IN THE COUNTRY.—The gross receipts of the recent tea at Miscouche were \$15,000, and at the Lot 16 Freshwater tea, held on the same place lately, the gross sum of \$272 was realized.

WAREHOUSE DAMAGED.—The schr. A. M. Smith, with a cargo of coal, collided with the warehouse on Peake's No. 2 Wharf last night, breaking a large hole in the side of the building and also damaging herself considerably.

OPEN AIR MEETING.—The Salvation Army open air meeting at the park yesterday afternoon attracted a large number of people to that popular resort. The music of the Fredrickson Band was greatly appreciated by many persons.

YACHT BURNED.—A handsome yacht owned by Mr. Charles J. Patton, of this city, was burned to the water's edge on Sunday morning about three o'clock. The yacht was anchored off the Railway wharf. How the fire originated is a mystery.

CRICKET.—The match at the Park on Saturday afternoon—Rights vs. Lefts—resulted in a decisive victory for the Lefts, their score at the close being 124, against 41 for the Rights. The top score for the Lefts was made by E. A. Ing, who rilled up 45, and J. A. Longworth came next with 24.

ADMITTED TO PAIL.—On the application of Mr. H. J. Palmer before the Chief Justice at Chambers, this morning, His Lordship made an order that Michael Power the elder be admitted to bail on both charges for which he is now confined in jail, each bail to be put in hand by Messrs. R. H. Fitzgerald and H. V. Palmer, two Justices of the Peace for Queen's County.

AQUATIC.—There will be a single-outrigger boat race for a purse of money, over the championship course, on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. There are five entries, and if the weather proves favorable, the race will be one of the most exciting and hotly contested seen in our harbor for many years. There will be first, second and third prizes, and the start will be made from Connelly's Wharf at 2 o'clock, sharp.

ACADIAN CELEBRATION.—The annual celebration of the Acadians of the Maritime Provinces will be held at St. Anthony's Church, Bloomfield, on Tuesday, August 15th. The proceedings will open in the morning with the blessing of the bell (imported from France expressly for the Bloomfield Church), by His Lordship Bishop McDonald, after which a solemn High Mass will be celebrated for which special music has been prepared by the pastor. A procession of the different Acadia societies will follow. In the afternoon a grand tea party will be held on the church grounds, and the proceedings will close with a concert in the evening.
