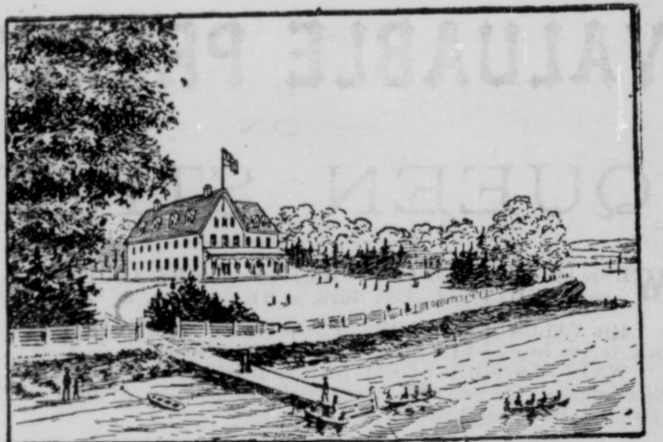

Writing of the policy of retaliation upon Canada upon which the United States Government seems bent, the Washington correspondent of the Chicago Inter-Ocean says:—"If there is a sentiment in the Gladstone Government in favor of a better understanding, such an understanding can probably be reached. It cannot be reached, however, through such mediums as Sir Charles Tupper." This is, as the Montreal Gazette remarks, a very doubtful compliment to Mr. Gladstone and his party, since it implies that a Liberal Government in Great Britain will consent to sacrifice Canadian interests at the dictation of the United States.

Hon. G. R. Dibbs, Premier of New South Wales, is about to visit Canada. In a speech delivered at a special meeting in the Guildhall, where he was presented with the freedom of the Worshipful Company of Turners, Mr. Dibbs expressed himself very strongly upon our general imperial relations:

"The people of Australia, as a whole, were English to the backbone, and they were as much a portion of the Empire as those who lived in the city of London itself. He would return to his colony with a better idea of England's power and greatness than he had ever had before. He visited England twenty-three years ago, but at that time he had not the opportunity of learning what he had since learnt. He would return home strongly impressed with the idea that the greatness of England and of her colonies, and the power of both would best be secured by the closest possible alliance between them. There was no doubt, at the time rolled on, that Australia would have a population of 100,000,000, which with England's 100,000,000 would be able to govern the world. England and her colonies, to use an American phrase, could 'stand against all creation.'"

He also attended the Chambers of Commerce Congress, and warmly supported the preferential trade proposals. So much did he hear about Canada, and so interesting was the information that he has cancelled his return ticket by Suez Canal, and will travel homewards through the Dominion. While at Ottawa it is said that Mr. Dibbs will confer with the Dominion Ministers as to steamship and telegraphic communications between Canada and Australia. He is a firm believer in the promotion of these great links of union.

### Notes from the Capital.

A further instalment of Maritime tourists passed through the Capital during the early morning of the 21st inst., en route to the West, whither the tide is evidently setting very strongly. Islanders were reported among the excursionists from Cavendish and Hunter River.

We have had a very warm spell recently. The mercury continued to nestle in the nineties. Haying season is over. The crop was far above the average and well saved, with but little if any rain. Dominion politics appear to be forgotten since prorogation, whilst great interest is taken in Imperial matters. The recent elections in England were closely watched and discussed, as was Hon. E. Blake's attitude; and since the great Home Rule speeches delivered by the Canadian orator his position is further and more favorably dwelt upon by all shades of politicians. It is very generally admitted that the great E. B. Blake was handicapped in Canada by certain discordant elements in his own fold.

The recent unfriendly legislation in the United States re canal tolls against Canadian tonnage on the lakes has not caused any extra uneasiness among the Canadian lake shippers as yet, nor is such probable, as the current of progress is more than likely to rush on, as well as the current of the great St. Lawrence River, heedless alike of such election doings and loud talk among Uncle Sam's boys, who seem to be presidentially disturbed at present. Rev. Father Burke and Hon. D. Ferguson had very friendly interviews to day with Sir John Thompson and one or two other cabinet ministers. Father Burke speaks glowingly of the Pacific.

Seven-eighths of the forest growth of the State of Washington consists of the Douglas fir.

The increase in the value of Chicago buildings last year amounts to more than \$55,000,000.

A New Jerseyman gives as a new cure for hay fever the smoking of pine needles with tobacco.

In 1790 three patents were issued; 100 years later the number was 28,292. The total number of patents granted during the 100 years was 453,944 or an average of nearly 13 patents for every day.

A telegram received at the Pittsburg Dispatch office a few days ago read as follows:—"James Dunlin, an eighteen-year-old son of James Dunlin, a prominent citizen, was killed in a shaft at Newburg. His recovery is doubtful."

## News Notes.

The eruption of Mount Etna shows no sign of abating.

The Paris Temps reports that yellow fever has broken out in Senegal.

The population of Hamilton in 1864 was 22,000, in 1895 it was 46,794.

Germany, in anticipation of a war with France, has a golden treasure of 960,000,000 marks stowed away in a safe place.

No less than a dozen lady artists have been successful at the salon in the Champs Elysees, three of whom received third-class medals, and the remainder were "honorably mentioned."

A visitor to Lake Temiscamingue tells the Ottawa Citizen that the crops in that district are better than for many years. The water of that part of the upper Ottawa country is very low indeed. As a consequence one lumber firm has about 80,000 logs stranded. The galena mine at that place has been pumped dry.

The government of Spain will receive tenders until Nov. 1st for the farming out of the Cuban customs revenue. The contracts will go into effect on January 1st, 1893. Least some local capitalist should forthwith decide to enter, it should be announced at the outset that security must be deposited on tenders for \$15,000,000 to the amount of \$3,750,000 cash or its equivalent in stocks.

Orkney and Shetland have polled their vote for Mr. Gladstone, leaving his majority in the new Parliament at 40. In 1886 the Ministerial majority by the coalition of Conservatives and Unionists was 118. That number was reduced to 78 in consequence of bye-elections, but six dissident Liberals could not support the Government policy in toto, so that in reality the Conservative majority was 66.

In 1891 the chief nationality of vessels entering at the port of New York was: British, 3,560,000 tons; American, 1,020,000 tons; German, 1,132,000 tons. Those clearing from that port were as follows: British, 3,488,000 tons; American, 852,000 tons; German, 1,020,000 tons. These figures show who is mistress of the seas, but they also prove that German competition is assuming formidable proportions.

The librarian of the British Museum, with an eye to the entertainment of posterity, has collected and stored away large quantities of the electioneering literature which covered England during this campaign. The character of the nation and her statesmen, if judged towards the end of the twentieth century by the leaflets and dog-eared copies which only the frenzy of a general election can produce, is not likely to stand in a very enviable light.

A regular outbreak of fury has taken place in Paris over the execution of the four men convicted in Sofia of plotting against Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria and his prime minister, M. Stambouloff. Nothing else could have been expected in Paris, but the excitement is not by any means confined to that city. It will be surprising if the affair does not lead to grave complications. M. Stambouloff has given proof of a stubbornness greater than foreign politicians have heretofore credited him with, and he will be regarded by neutral onlookers as a dangerous man to command the helm in Bulgaria.

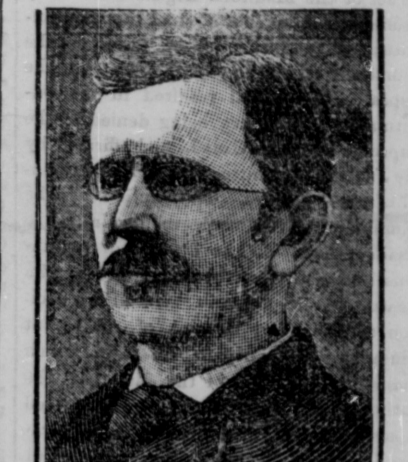
The Norwegian crisis has ended in a manner on which the friends of union may felicitate themselves, though it really only postpones a solution of the question at issue. The Left and Right showed their good sense in combining to break a deadlock which, if it did not cause disaster, must result in a grievous waste of time and energy. They have requested Mr. Steen and his colleagues to resume the reins of government, leaving the determination of the consular problem to come about by the lapse of time. To this the ministers have assented and, meantime, the consular representation of Sweden and Norway will remain as before. It is not safe to imagine, indeed, how the same Crown could have a dual consular representation.

Throughout the province of Quebec and Eastern Ontario, the crop reports are of a generally very favorable character. Hay is nearly everywhere over an average crop, the only exceptions being on very low-lying lands along the creeks and rivers which were overflowed for a time during the heavy rains. In the French country, peas, which are there a staple crop, have suffered a good deal from scalding, and potatoes have also received some hurt from an overplus of moisture, but oats will be a good crop, and other grains in so far as they are grown, look well. In Ontario, hay appears everywhere hay appears to have an abundant crop and harvested successfully, while coarse grains are doing well. The cool, breezy weather earlier in July has largely served to overcome the injury that has been done to wheat in many places by excessive rains, and the hot weather of the past week has been admirably calculated to ripen the grain. With but few exceptions the cereal crops in the province promise a rich harvest. There may, however, be a question whether the excessive heat has not ripened the grain too fast and thus prevented its filling.
