**CN's Ocean Limited To Carry Railway's New Color Scheme**

**MONTGOMERY** — When the Ocean Limited arrives in the Maritimes next Thursday she will be wearing Canadian National Railway's sparkling new livery.

All the cars will be painted in the new black and off-white color scheme and the train will be headed by an orange-colored locomotive with black and white decorative stripes on its sides.

It will be a proud day for Maritimers, for the famed Ocean Limited has been chosen by CN to be the first complete train to wear the new colors in regular service anywhere in Canada.

The new livery is part of the system-wide redesign program which CN launched as external evidence of its fresh approach to the old problems of railroading. One of the first fruits of this program — the prize-winning CN symbol — is painted in bold red-orange on the sides of the redesigned cars.

For the redesign experts the choosing of a new color scheme was no easy task. They had to pick colors that would look bright and smart — even under the hazy conditions of every traveler knows is inevitable on long journeys.

**Union Battle At Sudbury Near Climax**

**TORONTO (CP)** — The union battle to represent the 14,700 employees of the International Nickel Company at Sudbury, Ont., will enter its final stages in a hearing here Friday, the Ontario Labor Relations Board announced Wednesday.

The hearing has been set to decide whether to count the votes cast by Inco workers in February to determine which union they wanted.

The board conducted the election to find out whether a majority of the workers wanted to stay with the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers (IUMS) or switch to the United Steelworkers of America (USWA).

A board hearing also opened Wednesday to consider the Steelworkers' application for certification as the Falconbridge Nickel Company which employs 2,000 men.

Murray Cotterill, public relations officer of the Steelworkers, said results of the Falconbridge hearing might not be known for a "couple of months."

Wednesday's hearing involving the board and representatives of the Steelworkers, Local 588 of Mine-Mill and Inco, probably will do no more than formally receive the certification application, Mr. Cotterill said.

Mr. Cotterill said he thought the Falconbridge hearing would be postponed to allow for a count of the ballots of the February vote.

The Steelworkers have made a formal application to have the ballots counted immediately.

**E.I. Sales Tax Revenue Nears \$2 Million Mark**

The total sales tax to be collected by the government for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1962, is expected to amount to \$2,000,000, Provincial Treasurer Melvin McQuaid predicted as he brought down the budget in the House Tuesday.

If the forecast proves correct, the sales tax will be the second largest source of revenue collected by the government from provincial sources, ranking only behind the tax on gasoline and diesel fuel, which amounts to \$2,250,000.

"This," Mr. McQuaid stated, "has been a remarkable achievement in a comparatively short period of time, and augurs well for the future of this levy which has proven far less unpopular than was predicted and, I suggest, hoped for by those who have been sitting tonight on your right."

"The provincial treasurer said the tax should amount to \$1,999,000 by the end of this month. From April 1961 until Jan. 31, 1962, sales tax collections amounted to \$1,628,013, made up of \$1,386,978 from registered vendors and \$41,004 from unregistered vendors.

**QUEENS IS TOPS** — Greatest revenue from registered vendors came from the Fifth District of Queens, which

includes Charlottetown, where \$753,567 was collected while the Fifth Prince District, including Summerside, contributed \$420,372. Vendors registered outside the province contributed \$300,327.

The merchandise group which includes jewelry stores, dry goods establishments, variety stores as well as general and departmental stores collected \$401,560, for the nine-month period under review.

The automotive group collected \$333,200 and the building material and machinery groups \$239,352. The highest groups were the government operated Motor Vehicle branch and the Liquor Control Commission which collected \$200,746.

The provincial welfare department, in newspaper advertisements, describes the children as ranging in age from four to 12 years and of both sexes and the best boys.

The department said Wednesday the family is the largest the department has ever attempted to settle as a group.

The ads say the children "have made up their own minds that they intend to remain together."

All six were described as being attractive and well adjusted, from Protestant Anglo-Saxon origins.

"The fortunate Protestant parents who are selected for these children have busy and active times to look forward to with the responsibilities and fun of guiding the future for a daughter and five sons," the ads say.

**New CIL Plant Is Scheduled For Dalhousie**

**MONTREAL (CP)** — Canadian Industries Ltd. announced Wednesday a \$5,000,000 plant will be built in Dalhousie, N.B.

The company said construction of the plant, which will manufacture chlorine and caustic soda, will begin in mid-summer.

The company said the plant is designed to supply Maritimes requirements for these chemicals and will employ 100 people enlarged to meet future needs.

The plant would employ about 30 people.

Final details of the design were still being worked out and the plant would therefore not be in operation until next year.

**Jobless Insurance Report Is Expected By Mid-Summer**

**OTTAWA (CP)** — The cabinet will likely get the report of the special committee of inquiry on unemployment in a race by mid-summer, a reliable source said Wednesday.

The four-man committee, headed by Toronto insurance executive Ernest C. Gill, was set up July 17 to examine all facets of the unemployment insurance program.

The committee is pressing work on its investigation as the Unemployment Insurance Fund appears to be heading toward the \$100,000,000 mark for its way up 20 years ago.

If the fund runs dry, the government will have an extra \$50,000,000 on hand as an emergency loan to safeguard the kiltly against claims by jobless workers.

The unemployment insurance fund was set up in 1941. At the end of its first year, it held \$25,000,000. By December, 1941, it contained \$55,000,000, then mounted to more than \$925,000,000 by the end of 1956.

Since the fund has been shrinking under pressure of mounting unemployment. Last June, it fell to \$119,270,000, but was fattened by summer contributions until it held \$163,500,000 by November, when the seasonal unemployment drama was renewed.

The fund held \$164,618,453 at the end of February.

Sources said Wednesday that \$7,390,326 was paid last month in benefits to unemployed workers—roughly \$41,500,000 as ordinary benefit payments and some \$15,700,000 as seasonal payments.

**Stewart Heads Special Group**

Premier Walter R. Stewart said yesterday that Provincial Secretary J. David Shaw will head a special committee that will deal with transportation problems if a rail strike is called next month.

One of the duties of the committee would be to set up a priority system on goods moving to and from the province of whatever means of transportation are available.

It is believed that the provincial civil defense organization, the public utilities commission, and the transportation section of the department of industry and natural resources are among the groups represented on the special committee.

Premier Shaw said he has not yet contacted the rail union as involved in the proposed strike to seek assurances that the Jordan ferry service would be in operation if the strike occurs.

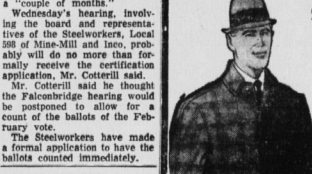

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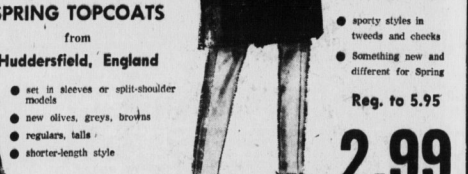
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
