Former Missionary
Guest Speaker at
Presbyterian Church

Rev. W. H. Hudspeth, M.B.E., M.A., General Secretary of British and Foreign Bible Society in Canada, was guest speaker on Sunday evening in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside. He is a veteran missionary, having spent thirty-eight years in mission work in China.

The speaker took for his text "Come over into Macedonia and help us" from the Acts of the Apostles 16:9. In his opening remarks, Mr. Hudspeth recalled the picture of Paul purposing to go to different places on a missionary journey, but the Divine hand upon him brought him to the sea-coast. In the night Paul had a vision of a Macedonian saying to him "Come over and help us." As a missionary he called attention to the fact that it was an Asiatic who two thousand years ago came to our help in the personage of Jesus Christ. At the present time we are witnessing a tension that has seldom been seen, perplexed by events taking place; the witnessing of the restless yearnings for the better things. "The trouble in the world today," said the minister, "is that Jesus Christ is being neglected." The world is interested in economics, science and other pursuits but the Bible is being neglected.

One of the great international societies has been working for 146 years towards the betterment of civilization by taking the story of Jesus to the ends of the earth and has been able to translate the Bible into 1000 different languages. The speaker stated three ways to take the Bible into the heart of the nation: (1) The Bible speaks to the hearts of men as no other book does; (2) The Bible releases forces which transform and dignify the mind and heart of mankind; (3) The Bible is the one book in the world that seeks to eradicate national and racial antagonism. Mr. Hudspeth related among several experiences of his life in China, that of being a Japanese prisoner, spending 90 days in a cell and three years in a concentration camp. The speaker urged the audience to renew their devotion to the Bible, and as a missionary to share the Bible with the whole world. In conclusion, he said "The Bible is the only key that will solve the world's problems."

The minister, Rev. J. Donald MacKay, presided at the meeting. The choir, under the direction of the organist, Mrs. Cleve Whelan, led the congregation in the singing of the hymns of praise and sang as the offertory anthem "The Radiant Morn Hath Passed Away."-S

Auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society at its 111th annual meeting held yesterday afternoon in the United Baptist Church Hall, Summerside. A representative gathering of the Auxiliary was in attendance. A great deal of important business was attended to relative to the Society and its work. The meeting was privileged in having the General Secretary for Canada, Rev. W. H. Hudspeth, M.B.E., M.A., in attendance. Mr. Hudspeth spoke to the meeting bringing words of encouragement and the greetings from the Head Office in Toronto. The Rev. E.M.B. Wheelock, B.A., B.D., S.T.M., of the District Secretary gave a report covering the activities of the past year. The president Mr. W. G. Hogg presented a fine report showing that the Auxiliary had had a very successful year. The treasurer, Mr. A. G. Putnam presented the financial report. Items included the following: General Contributions, \$7,938.69, interest 276.30, bequests \$1,332.00, refund \$39.87; total income \$9,601.86. The sum of \$5,000.00 was forwarded as a grant to the Head Office in Toronto. Eleven new life membership certificates were issued during the year. The various reports were adopted on motion. prizes was fired under the same conditions as the Sir Arthur Currie Match at the D. C. R. A. shoot at Ottawa. It created much interest and some 22 riflemen participated. The winner was Major A. F. Gormley with Cpl. A. Rodd and Cpl. P.J. Landrigan runners up. Later on there were spoon shoots and finally the City Rifle Championship which had 29 competitors. The day was very favorable, making high scores difficult. The trophy was won by Capt. E. R. Burke, who tied with Cpl. Percy Landrigan, each having 92 points. Capt. Burke won the shoot off. A few weeks after the annual matches a strong team was selected to take part in the D. C. R. A. matches at Ottawa. With cadets they numbered 29 and gave a good account of themselves. Over 600 competitors were present at the shoot from all parts of Canada. We are proud to report that in the various team matches which our Island riflemen competed in the P. E. I. Reg't 17th RECCE won the Coates Cup, The Borden Cup and the Gordon Highlanders Trophy and placed well up in other matches. Their numerous wins were most gratifying considering that they competed against the best teams from leading regiments all over Canada. We are also proud to report that Major A. F. Gormley again qualified for the Bisley Team, this being the fifth time. This Province was worthily represented at Bisley by the appointment of Brig. W. W. Reid, D. S. O., E. D. as Commandant of the Canadian team. Brig. Reid was very popular with all the members and a great deal of its success was due to him. Capt. Roy McCabe, one of our best rifle shots, who had placed 16th in the Bisley aggregate, was a member of the team and gained much in experience from the trip. The completion of the new bungalow added greatly to the comfort and convenience of our riflemen throughout the season. It is up to date in every respect and a great credit to its builder, Mr. Walter Mathieson, and the Department of National Defence. Our Range was kept in splendid order all through the season by Sgt. Arthur King. In closing I would like to express our grateful thanks to all those who by their contributions have made possible the continuance of our prize list; our Provincial Government, through the Premier, J. Walter Jones, has rendered us very great assistance and Mayor E. Earle MacDonald and the City Council of Charlottetown have also materially helped us. We assure them that their grants have been of great value to us.
