

Highway Project Is Chief Item At B. Of T. Meeting

The Summerside Board of Trade held its closing meeting prior to the summer recess and was more than usually well attended. Through the courtesy of the manager, Mr. Earl Cannon, the meeting was held in the spacious office of the Unemployment Insurance Commission with Mr. C.R. MacLagan presiding.

Largely important matters of interest to the town and surrounding community were given discussion, chief of which was the matter of paving the highway from the Red Bridge to Summerside. It was noted that some work has already been done on this stretch and the president pointed out the necessity of having this highway put into good travelling condition. He pointed out also that it was most essential that any portion of the work which might be started this summer should be finished before winter set in and the meeting decided to ask the Provincial Government to complete as much as possible of this work during the coming summer.

Catholic Welfare Agency Has Final Financial Drive Plans

Final arrangements for a campaign to raise \$8,200 from among the Catholic families of Prince Edward Island were completed at a regular meeting of the board of directors of the Prince County Catholic Welfare Agency on Wednesday evening. The president, Dr. Hubert MacNeill, announced that Mr. Leonce Arsenault has accepted the position of campaign chairman.

In Summerside the drive will be carried out in a blitz campaign on Sunday, June 16th. The Summerside portion of the total objective is \$3,000.

All the parish priests in Prince County have been advised of the campaign and asked to submit the name of an organization or an individual who will be responsible for the drive in that parish. As these names are received information will be sent out and it is hoped that the campaign will be under way throughout the whole county in the immediate future.

The executive director, Sister Mary Eugene, reported that statistics for the month of May were as follows: Home visits 85, office visits 176, families assisted 35, individuals assisted 40, new cases of unwed mothers four. She said that the provision of a car for the use of the agency has been a wonderful help making it much easier to carry on the work throughout the country. She reported on the child welfare clinic which has been started for the children under the supervision of the agency and is being conducted by Dr. Kenneth Grant. It will be held every month.

She explained how much more beneficial it is to have children brought in for home care rather than being boarded in an orphanage. She said that if the government could be persuaded to make grants to cover the board of children who are wards of welfare agencies it would be a great assistance in carrying out the work.

The treasurer's report showed that donations during the month amounted to \$207.75 and without these donations it would be almost impossible to continue the work.

The chairman of the child welfare committee, Mr. F. Earle MacDonald, said he had discussed with Judge W.E. Darby, Judge of the Juvenile Court the general question of juveniles who get into trouble with the law. Judge Darby said he would welcome any assistance that the agency could give.

Since the currency reform of 1948, few Germans have thought of much except work. Numbed by defeat, dazed by the desolation around them, they took refuge in toil. Today, the briefcase is the badge of business bustle. Nearly every man carries one.

Complaints have been heard that reconstruction sometimes reflects American influence. Those acquainted with the old-fashioned charm of pre-war Frankfurt, for instance, feel that the new broad, straight avenues cling too closely to the American pattern.

Hardy Crew Of Mayflower II Mix Old And New

The hardy crew of Mayflower II, now duplicating the voyage of the original Mayflower, dine on pilgrim fare of biscuits, salted beef and pork. But also on board are such modern dishes as rock lobster, baked beans, spaghetti, ox tongue, mushrooms and vegetables.

However, the present-day sailors are getting along without one luxury that helped sustain the founding fathers on their hazardous trip—beer. Mayflower II has substituted water tanks for the original ship's beer casks.

The Limehouse victualling firm of Burney Limited stocked Mayflower II with a large variety of canned goods, a necessary sacrifice to authenticity because 17th-century ship supplies provided a monotonous and dangerous diet that lacked vitamins. Many passengers and crew members on the first Mayflower suffered from scurvy during the two-month voyage.

OLD FOODS DIFFICULTY - Provisioning the ship with modern foods was easy, but the tuallers had some trouble reproducing the old foods. They searched most of England before they found a butcher who knew the almost lost art of salting meat in the traditional manner.

Program For Olympic Games Taking Shape

EVIAN, France (AP)—Bit by bit the program for the 1960 Olympic games in Rome is taking shape in difficult negotiations between the sports federations and the Italian organizing committee.

Bruno Zauli, secretary-general of the Italian committee, has reached a tentative agreement with the Track and Field (athletics) Federation to put the main attraction of any summer Olympics in the middle of the program. The negotiations are going on here parallel with a meeting between the executive board of the International Olympic Committee and the international federations.

Zauli's first idea was to switch track and field from the start of the program to the end, but D. T. P. Pain of Britain, secretary of the International Athletics Federation, objected.

"The track teams are the biggest group from almost all nations," Pain explained. "A big effort is always made to get every one on hand for the opening ceremony. But if these big teams had to wait 10 days before starting competition, the expense would be too great."

Nine Whoopers At Nesting Grounds

OTTAWA (CP)—Nine whooping cranes, among the rarest birds in the world, have been spotted from the air at the nesting grounds in the Sas River area of Wood Buffalo National Park, the Canadian Wildlife Service reported Thursday.

Nine is the largest number of the birds—which ornithologists say are in danger of extinction—ever seen at the nesting grounds so early in the year.

The report came from wildlife biologist N. S. Novakowski in the park, a 17,300 square-mile wilderness sanctuary straddling the boundary of northern Alberta and the Northwest Territories.

He said five of the whoopers, appear to be sitting on nests "either hatching or brooding."

The wildlife service said it was the best news of the whoopers to come out of the Wood Buffalo National Park since the nesting grounds were first discovered there in 1954.

Last year at this time only one nesting bird had been observed and in 1955, only three pairs had been spotted by the month of June. Only 29 whooping cranes are known to exist. Of these 24 are wild, while three adults, crippled in flight, and two young, now are in the New Orleans and San Antonio zoos.
