NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The mobility of the capital of the Orange Free State is remarkable. The capital is now at Vrède.

Yes, Premier Farquharson is in duty bound to explain why he did not issue the writ of election for the West River district according to the promise he gave Mr. Wise.

It will be recalled yesterday that Mr. Pineau had been sworn in a member of the executive in the place of Mr. MacKinnon, who continues to hold the office of Attorney-General. But the report is not confirmed.

All but \$20,000.00 paid out of the Provincial treasury last year was interest on the public debt. That little amount would build two steel bridges or all the additional buildings recommended by the Commissioners for the Hospital for Insane.

It will be under a heavy handicap that the Liberal party will enter the coming parliamentary contest. As the Montreal Gazette remarks, "Its leading members are its load. Their broken promises are its drawbacks, their accomplished acts their condemnation."

The Montreal Gazette remarks "that Government papers generally are advising party friends to prepare for the elections. The alarm may be premature, or it may be the preliminary to the early announcement of the dissolution of Parliament. The Opposition would do well to act on the second possibility. There is no such thing as being too ready for a parliamentary contest."

Dr. Borden, Minister of Militia, took occasion during his visit to Boston to revive that ancient ghost—unrestricted reciprocity. He said he was in favor of "allowing trade to flow as freely between the two countries as the tides of the Atlantic flow upon their coasts." Another interesting remark he made was that if he resided for any length of time in the United States, he would become an American citizen. As has been well remarked, it is "unfortunate for Dr. Borden that the Boston papers convey his remarks to people for whom they were not intended."

TRAINS WEST.

Rev. Father Burke Expresses Discontent With Existing Arrangement.

"The change of time, or rather the additional train west, is not regarded as an unmixed blessing."

"The Summer Time Table has been given to the East and why not to the West?"

"The present arrangement is satisfactory to nobody but the railway officials and possibly a few commercial travellers who want a mid-day excursion, with plenty of car room," said Father Burke to THE EXAMINER yesterday.

"It is absolutely absurd to start us out of Alberton at 7.30 and not give a moment for dinner or anything else at Summerside and land us at Charlottetown at 3 o'clock as I was today."

"Everybody on the train complained, and justly."

"The mid-day train is no good—nobody asked for it, nobody wants it."

"We have a right to connection with the boat immediately that navigation opens at Summerside, and the summer disposition of trains, and we will have it sooner or later."

"The fact that the summer arrangement has come in east of Charlottetown makes the present makeshift west of Summerside simply intolerable. We are kept twenty-four hours out of our foreign mail, and our passengers from abroad are delayed that long to suit the whims of the Superintendent of the road."

"We have had a dozen changes of time west since last fall where none was necessary. A little modification of the summer time table should alone be made in winter."

"As matters stand with so many and such absurd changes nobody knows when to look for trains."

"And they are not advertised except in the reptile press—every paper in P. E. Island should keep the Time Table standing for the information of the public. It is too bad to have to keep up an agitation for reform which the authorities, if they have any gumption at all, should see to come."

"The West which is the best paying and worst served portion of the system, has got to the limit of endurance in these matters."

LOOK OUT FOR DANGER

It is about time the public were given information as to the condition this steamer is in. It is generally known that she is not safe, and our city and country will get a great shaking up some day. It is bad enough for passengers to travel on a steamer that is unsafe and not seaworthy; but when to that is added no engineer, and worse still, no life saving appliances, what an awful calamity it will be.

ANOTHER PASSENGER.

CANADIAN RAILWAYS.—The length of the railways in Canada according to the Departmental report is 13,553 miles, controlled by 84 companies. The 1,200, aside from those owned by the government, represent a capital investment, credited as paid up, of \$964,699,784, of which \$362,053,494 consists of bonds actually sold. The gross earnings of the roads amounted in 1899 to \$62,243,784, of which \$15,929,683 was contributed by passengers, and \$40,101,036 was paid for freight, and \$2,842,681 for express and mail matter carried. The operating expenses amounted to \$49,705,217.

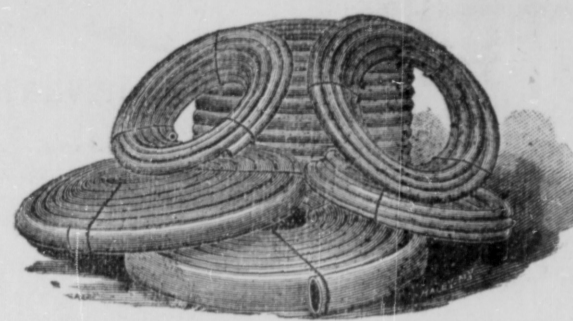
