**ANNUAL MEETING HELD AT O'LEARY.**

**Dr. P. C. Murphy is Elected President.**

The annual meeting of the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Prince took place in the O'Leary Hall on Tuesday, the 26th inst, at 2 o'clock, p. m. There were present seventy-two delegates, besides a number of officers of the association and representative men of the party from different sections of the riding.

In the absence of the President, Mr. John P. Brennan, who was unable to be present from illness, Joseph F. Arsenault, M. L. A., one of 1st vice presidents, was called to the chair.

Mr. Arsenault, in a neat and eloquent speech, opened the association. The secretary then read the president's report, which was an able review of the success of the association for the past year, and extremely regretting that he was unable to be present to take part in the deliberations of the association.

Moved by Edward Hackett that the report be received and laid on the table. Also that the thanks of this association be tendered to Mr. Brennan for his able and impartial conduct and valuable assistance to the party, and hoped that in the kindness of Providence he might soon be restored to health, which was carried unanimously by a standing vote.

Dr. Murphy, after his election as President in an able and cordial manner, thanked the delegates for the high honor conferred on him and hoped the association would not have cause to regret his election.

Mr. Mr. Edward Hackett, in an able

speech, seconded by Mr. McElroy, moved the following resolution which was carried unanimously by a standing vote:

Resolved, That the Liberal-Conservative Association of West Prince, in convention assembled, hereby to express its hearty approval of the course pursued by Sir Charles Tupper and his supporters in the Senate and House of Commons in their opposition to the present government of Canada.

Mr. Geo. R. Montgomery, in a forcible speech, then submitted the following resolution:

Resolved, That this annual meeting of the Liberal Conservative party view with alarm the extravagant and scandalous manner of conducting the affairs of this province by the moribund Farquharson Government.

Further Resolved, That they commend in the highest manner the fight made by Her Majesty's loyal Opposition during the session of the Legislature just closed, in the interests of honest government and the people's rights.

The resolution was carried amidst much enthusiasm.

Mr. H. B. Huestis, with his usual eloquence, moved the following resolution, seconded by Mr. W. D. White, which was also carried by unanimous vote:

"Resolved, That we, the Liberal-Conservative delegates in assembly convened, desire to express our approval of and confidence in our worthy representative, Jas. E. Birch, for the manly and energetic course he has pursued as a member of Her Majesty's loyal Opposition.

Birch, after which the meeting adjourned by singing God Save the Queen, three cheers for the Queen, three cheers for Sir Charles Tupper Hon. Dan Gordon and Lord Roberts.

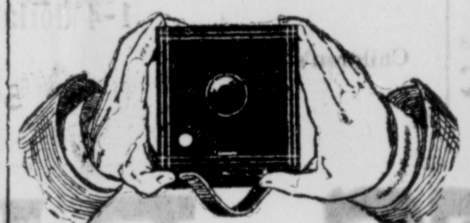
**THE JULY NUMBER.**

We are in receipt of the fifth number of the second volume of the Prince Edward Island Magazine—issued to-day. The cover shows a summer camping scene over Byron's well-known lines:—

"There is a pleasure in the pathless wood,  
There is a rapture on the lonely shore,  
There is a society when none intrude,  
By the deep sea, and music in its roar."

For the frontispiece there is an excellent picture of the "The Boys' Highland Brigade" in connection with St. James' Church in this city, every member of the Brigade coming out clear and distinct—with Major Stewart and Captain Bardlet in their midst.

The letter-press is illustrated in some parts and is, as usual, exceedingly interesting to all who are interested in the tight little Island. "A Life Sketch" by one who possesses in no small measure, "the vision and the faculty Divine" is followed by Father Burke's explanation of "Who Named the Magdalens," and this by Mr. McSwain's study of "Our Summer Birds." Mr. Walter Simpson continues his racy sketches and anecdotes of Cavendish in the Olden Time; and Mr. J. E. Fletcher portrays lightly and brightly the Newspaper life and Newspaper men of P. E. Island when he was editor here. "The Little Island of the Brudenell" will afford interesting reading to many persons, and so will the article by Miss Matie Barr on "The Work of Nurses in Schools and Colleges." The second part of "My Forer" by Mr. Jeremiah S. Clark, B. A., is philosophical, while Mr. L. U. Fowler's second article on Bedeque and its people is full of information about the settlement and developments of one of the oldest and wealthiest sections of the Island province. The incidental verses and paragraphs are good as usual.
