THE MARKET to-day was fairly well attended with trade moderate. Eggs are in fair supply and sold at 11 to 12 cents per dozen. Butter fresh was scarce at 26 to 28 cents per lb., and tub at 23 to 24 cents per lb. Hay was in moderate supply at about 50 cents per 100 lbs. Fresh herring were in for the first time to-day and sold quickly at 8 to 10 cents per dozen.

THE CRIMINAL ACT.

Steamship Inspection Act.

OTTAWA, April 22

Sir John Thompson yesterday introduced a bill relating to witnesses and evidence. This was a bill to permit a person charged with any criminal offence to give evidence in his own behalf. It was read the first time. The House went into committee on the act to amend the Steamboat Inspection Act. One clause of the old bill made it compulsory to use metallic life boats and metallic buckets on steamers. The bill made obligatory enforcement of provisions by the Governor in Council. It was desired now to place discretionary powers with the minister. Mr. Davies wanted the law altered without giving discretionary powers to the Government. Read a first time. Other business unimportant.
