PRIVATE WALKER COMING HOME

Invalided Canadians on the Corinthian.

THE CANADIANS WILL COME HOME BY WAY OF ENGLAND

General Delarey Reported to Have Died of Wounds.

LONDON, Sept. 5.—Twenty-five invalided Canadian soldiers sailed on the Corinthian for Canada. Among them is Private J. S. Walker of the 82nd Regiment, Queen's County, Prince Edward Island.

All the Canadians in South Africa will return home by way of England.

PRETORIA, Sept. 5.—It is reported that General Delarey, the Boer Commander, has died of wounds received at Elands River.

LI HUNG CHANG'S LATEST MOVE

Anxious to Have Peking Evacuated

TELEGRAM TO THE CHINESE MINISTER AT LONDON.

Hint of a Secret Compact Between Germany and Russia.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, Sept. 5.—Today's despatches from Shanghai and Tien Tsin refer to the hopeless confusion and mismanagement of the Chinese telegraphic system which may probably account in part for the delay in getting news from China. Another reason for delay doubtless is the anxiety of the Chinese authorities to procure the evacuation of the capital.

According to Shanghai advices Li Hung Chang has wired the Chinese minister in London as follows: "Our St. Petersburg Minister has persuaded Russia to leave Peking. You are useless if you cannot persuade England."

It is asserted that Earl Li has promised Russia three Manchurian provinces if she secures the withdrawal of the allied forces from Peking and favorable peace terms from the powers. Both the Empress Dowager and Li Hung Chang are said to be lavishing money to attain these objects. There is no sign as yet of any decision on the part of the powers regarding the Russian proposals.

Japanese papers unreservedly condemn the evacuation of Peking, and hint that there is a secret compact between Germany and Russia to the great detriment of Great Britain and Japan.

SHANGHAI, Sept. 5.—Li Hung Chang, through an understanding with Russia, has changed front towards the representatives of the other powers, and has been insolent and almost insulting in his interviews with them.

Li Hung Chang has recommended the Dowager Empress to appoint the two southern viceroys who made the agreement with the Consuls to keep order in their territories, the president of the Tsung Li Yamen, and himself, as commissioners to treat with the Powers.

Li Hung Chang starts for Tien Tsin in a week on a Chinese ship, conveyed by a Japanese warship.

FATAL DROWNING ACCIDENT.

Two Well-Known Young Men Lose Their Lives.

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 5.—Aubrey Lund, ledger keeper of the Merchant's Bank of Halifax, formerly of Sackville N. B. and Aubrey Vaughan, of this city, were drowned in a boating accident about fifty miles up the coast on Saturday.

LETTER FROM REV. MR. FULLERTON.

Springs, South Africa, July 31, 1900.

MY DEAR MR. JAMES,—I have just heard from one of Lord Roberts' staff that we leave here in a few weeks and that we shall likely be home towards the end of September. We go by London, the only Colonial Regiment that will go en bloc. Our stay in the old country cannot possibly last more than four or five days, and if they send us back in a liner we shall be in Canada in less time than it took us to reach Cape Town from Quebec on our outward trip.

To-day we have good news and official. Five thousand Boers surrendered to Gen. Hunter, bringing with them seventeen guns, and further that Buller got in good work, dealing such a terrific blow to the enemy that they had 1500 killed, wounded and prisoners.

The weather here is charming from our standpoint, beautifully warm sunshine during the day and delightfully cool in the evening. The country however looks barren indeed, and although we are now at the beginning of spring there is not a sign of anything green—everything and everywhere brown, parched and desolate looking. We all miss more than we can tell, the red and green of the Island, as well as the plentiful sea breezes with which the Islanders are favored. There is no better spot I know to live on. This country is all right for the individual who is prepared to prostrate all his powers at the shrine of mammon, but for those who seek other things, I should say there is no place around the Rand district.

We only await the return of "Bobs" to Pretoria to hear finally about our marching orders.

AT KELLY'S CROSS.—The monument lately erected at Kelly's Cross to the memory of Fr. Duffy, the pioneer priest in St. Joseph's parish, will be unveiled with appropriate ceremony by Bishop McDonald on Sunday, Sept. 16th inst. Services shall begin at 9.30 a. m., followed by a Pontifical High Mass, during which the consecration sermon will be preached by Rev. Dr. Doyle, one of Fr. Duffy's successors in St. Joseph's, and for many years the beloved pastor of the same. A collection in aid of the monument fund will be taken up during the services. In the afternoon the Sacrament of Confirmation will be administered by Bishop McDonald.
