A ROMANTIC MARRIAGE—A romantic wedding took place at Esperanza, Kan., last week, the principals being Prof. William O. Symms and Miss Anna Urquhart, the ceremony taking place at what may possibly be the dearest of the latter, who was thrown from a carriage and injured. The wedding was planned to take place a month later, but owing to the accident and the desire of both to be united ere death could separate them, the ceremony took place as above stated.

PLACING THE BOOYS—The Stanley arrived here last night, placing the buoy at North Cape. She left again this morning at ten o'clock with the Tryon seal buoy, after placing which it was the intention to proceed to Cape Tormentine and place two buoys marking the north and south entrance to the harbor. It is expected that she will return to Charlottetown to-morrow night and take on board the automatic buoy for Indian Rocks, place it, and proceed to Pictou to make ready for the fishery protection service.

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE—A despatch from Moncton, dated May 6th says: "George McCully, aged 70, who came here a few months ago from P. E. Island, having previously resided in St. John, suicided by jumping into the river." George was well known in Charlottetown, he having been employed as clerk in the Queen Hotel up to August last, when he left here for Moncton. Previous to that time he was porter at the Hotel Davies. He was also employed at the old Revere House, kept by Mrs. McNeill. His sudden and untimely death is regretted by all who knew him.

THE OLIVETTE—The Plant Line steamer Olivette will make her first trip from this port for Boston, calling at Hawkebury and Halifax, on Friday, May 17, at 12 o'clock, noon, and every Friday thereafter until further notice. This will give passengers from the Island an opportunity of spending a day in Halifax, the steamer arriving there Saturday morning, and not leaving for Boston until ten o'clock that evening, arriving at Boston early Monday morning. This steamer is one of the fastest and most elaborately fitted up sailing out of United States ports, and will be well worthy of inspection on arrival.

THE AMONEY WAS PAID.—When Mr. Peter McNaughton was burned to death last November he had just insured his life for \$1,000 in the Home Life Assurance Co. The policy arrived in the postoffice here the very night of the fire. The company at first by reason of the clause that the policy must be delivered to the insured when in good health, hesitated to pay. Messrs. Grant & Sweeney, acting for the beneficiary, contended that the delivery in the Toronto post office was the delivery so far as the company was concerned. After friendly negotiations, the company to-day sent the cheque for the full amount.—Moncton Transcript.

JUBILEE CELEBRATION—July, 1895, is the fifth anniversary of the formation of the congregation of Strathallan. On the 3rd of that month her sons and daughters intend celebrating her jubilee. Speakers will be present, who will be able to give interesting records of the congregation, and in many other ways, interest and instruct those who will attend. Refreshments will be provided for all, and everything done by the committee in charge that will tend to make the day pleasant, and it is expected that there will be a reunion of a large number of Strathallanites, their friends and others, who wish to spend a day in a pleasant and profitable manner on one of the picturesque hills of Hartsville.

CITY SCHOOL BOARD.—The regular meeting of the City School Board was held last night. The teachers' report showed an enrollment of 1382 an increase of ten over last month. The percentage of attendance in the three schools was 89, that of Prince Street School being 91, Queen Square 89, and West Kent 86. There were 419 cases of tardiness a decrease of 75 from last month, and 21 cases of corporal punishment a decrease of 6 from last month. The teachers made 133 visits to the homes of their pupils during the month. The best percentage of attendance in West Kent was made by Mr. McLoughlin in Prince Street by Miss McDonald and in Queen Square by Mr. Cullen and Miss Farmer. The fewest cases of tardiness was in Miss Haslam's department, there being a clean record. Acting on a suggestion made by Lieut. Governor Howland was ordered that copies of the Dominion-made forms printed expressly for Canadian schools be secured by the Secretary. Appropriations were made to the schools for the observance of Arbor Day which will be held on the 23rd inst. The Secretary was authorized to collect tuition fees from non-resident pupils.

A bill before Parliament, entitled an "Act to amend the Dairy Products Act, 1893," provides that "No person shall offer, expose or have in his possession for sale, any cheese or butter which is produced in Canada or the United States, unless the name of the country where such cheese or butter was produced, and the month and year of manufacture there of, is branded, stamped or marked in a legible and indelible manner, upon the outside of every box or package which contains the same, and in the case of cheese itself, before leaving the place of manufacture, in letters not less than three-sixteenths of an inch high and one quarter of an inch wide."
