MR. EATON'S WORDS AT EXHIBITION UNDERLINED BY UNGAVA DEVELOPMENT

Mr. Cyrus Eaton, noted Cleveland industrialist, who officially opened the Provincial Exhibition here last month, wrote to The Guardian this week. He enclosed an article which appeared recently in the Toronto Star dealing with the vast developments in iron ore in the Ungava area.

When Mr. Eaton was here last month he said at the time in reference to the same subject, "You are right next door to these mining camps and the cities which are developing throughout the vast

new domain. Here you have a natural area to produce and supply in ever-increasing quantities. The hope full advantage will be taken of this splendid opportunity."

Mr. Eaton also noted that Island had other obvious areas which should be expanded with profit to the Province. He said we are only becoming conscious of the vast new empire in Canada extending north for 400 miles from Montreal, containing mineral deposits of inestimable value.

Mr. Eaton urged the people not to be such good parents as to let their boys get out when the going is tough "and there is nothing to be done."

At the same time he said that the article in the Star states that some of the iron is within miles of Hudson Strait and is the world's bleakest real estate, is a white womanless world, inhabited only by two white men, a trader and a priest. However, there are many other camps, are mushrooming as power supply and geological parties comb the rocks paved tundra.

The mining is being done by Eskimos to whom the development is proving a godsend as Government relief and family allowance.

The main party up there now is headed by Cyrus Eaton, Jr., who said that preliminary work is far enough ahead that a decision to start construction can be expected within a year. This decision is thought to sell over to German companies, of which one is the famous Krupp Works. To this end, they have already been started.

The article states that Mr. Eaton, Sr., has already spent \$1,000,000 of his own money on the project. He sparked Ontario's Steep Rock mines into production when other U.S. steel companies said it was impossible because the ore was under a large lake. He drained the lake and today quantities of what is some of the richest iron ore in the world are being mined.

The Ungava deposits have huge potentialities and are expected to cost over \$100,000,000, including power plant, docks and construction of new ships. Processing plants and preparatory work and equipment for mining will total \$20,000,000 to \$20,000,000.

Public Gives New Bank Notes Mixed Reception

The public got its first look at Canada's new bank notes Thursday and gave them a mixed reception. Their novel appearance apparently led some people to think the bills were not "real money."

The new bills, first to bear the portrait of the Queen, went into circulation in a Canadian Press survey shows that many Canadians gave them a cool reception.

Vancouver bankers reported brisk demand and favorable comment on the bills. However, at Halifax a bank teller suggested the notes, stripped of the old ornamentation, look like merchandise coupons.

A widely-travelled Montrealer said the bills remind him of wartime occupation money and in Ottawa, a female bank teller said the notes remind her of "stage money."

"TOO NICE TO SPEND" Toronto residents gave them a fairly good reception, but a few persons in Kitchener, Ont., balked momentarily when the bills were handed across the teller's window. The bills looked phoney, while others commented: "Too nice to spend—they should be framed instead."

Edmonton bank cashiers became annoyed when they found the bills had a tendency to stick together. One cashier ran into this stickiness twice and almost gave a customer an extra \$1 and \$10 bill.

The big surprise to many was the sudden and sharp change in the over-all design. Gone was the graceful, curving ornamental design, giving way to stiff, straight lines and plain lettering.

Probably it was this change that led to criticism that the bills looked cheap. The design of the Queen's portrait got favorable comment in Montreal, Halifax and Vancouver, but some Edmonton residents suggested it did not do justice to the Queen.

NEW BILLS SMALLER Canadians did not seem to mind the narrower cut of the bills. The new bills are of the same length but one-eighth of an inch narrower than the old notes.

Montrealers were pleased with the word "Canada" carried in big letters across the face of the bills. And many residents praised the replacement of the old symbolic figures with scenes of Canada's countryside on the reverse side.

Though the new issue had been well publicized before it was circulated and though the Bank of Canada placed big ads in Canadian newspapers informing the public of the bills, there was no rush, except in Vancouver, to get the new notes.

Vancouver bankers said many collectors had placed orders for complete sets of eight notes—from \$1 to \$100. By mid-day, Vancouver demand for the notes was so great that banks had to limit the supply.

A mixed tone ruled the senior metal and utility section while carriers and banks generally held firm. The remainder of the industrial market drifted into softer territory.

Mines were easier in a narrow range. Producers were off 25 cents and Beausage dipped 20 cents. Western oils were trendless.

TORONTO (CP)—Some western oils climbed sharply to steal the show in a day of narrow-range, irregular stock market trading.

Biggest volumes went to lower-priced mines and western oils. Alameda's end industrials were weak, western oils and base metals ahead, and golds, uraniums and Manitowadge stocks mixed.

Martineau and his son, Bobby, owned 50 per cent of the club's stock.

"We are not interested in operating in a four-club league," Martineau said in announcing sale of the stock to club president Emile Couture.

He said it would be financial suicide for Frontenacs to play this year without the powerful clubs of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior "A" League. He added that the Quebec Junior League had its worst season financially last year despite participation of the Ontario clubs.
