A BIG INCREASE.—From the Canada Gazette it is learned that during the first three months of the present fiscal year, ending Sept. 30, the exports of Canada have been over \$2,500,000 more than during the same period last year. The increased export of fish for the last quarter amounts to nearly \$250,000.

HE DESERVED SUCCESS.—A New York telegraph operator named Murphy, made a determined effort to commit suicide last week. He shot himself in the left breast, cut his head with a small penknife, fractured his skull with a stove lifter, and then tried to hang himself with a clothes line. He will probably die.

MONEY NO OBJECT.—On Saturday last the following cablegram was sent from Detroit to the treasurer of the Irish National League: "To Joseph Gillis Beggar, M. P., Cardiff, Wales—Your friends in America are of one mind. Coercion must be fought to the last ditch. I place to your credit to-day ten thousand dollars. (Signed) Charles O'Reilly, Treasurer."

SYSTEMATIC SWINDLING.—Since the disappearance of Mordecai E. Burch, law student in Ryker & Ingersoll's office, at St. Catherine's, Ont., it has been discovered that he systematically defrauded his employers by entering in the bank-book amounts he was sent to deposit and keeping the money, and previous to leaving with the \$7,000 obtained on two of his employer's drafts, he secured a \$100 diamond ring on credit.

QUICK SHAVING.—Recently, in London, there was an extraordinary shaving match against time decided, Teddy Wick, the champion barber, being backed to shave 50 persons in 60 minutes for £15. He actually shaved 77 in 59 minutes and 53 seconds, and thus won the stakes. In the first quarter of an hour he disposed of 21 men, in the second 14, in the third 19, and in the last 14 minutes and 53 seconds he put on a spurt and finished off 23.

DEATH OF AN ISLANDER.—The Gloucester, Mass., Advertiser records the death of Pius Steele, aged 24 years, a native of Newport, (P. E. I.), and a kinsman of the Bishop of Charlottetown. His death was the result of exposure, from a singular chain of circumstances. While acting as manager of a benefit ball in aid of a man injured on the roller coast, some one, possibly knowing he was away from home, attempted to break into his house. His young wife, being frightened, took her babe and sought shelter in the attic, where they remained until the husband's return. The next day she was attacked with fever, and after six weeks close attention at her bedside Mr. Steele was taken sick, and in his weakened state failed to rally.

A DISTINGUISHED VISITOR.—Frank C. McNeally, who robbed the Saco, Me., Savings Bank of \$200,000 in cash and securities, was in the city yesterday week. He registered at the Victoria as Thomas Barnes, of Syracuse, N. Y., and said he had come down the line on a freight train. He breakfasted at the hotel and was then driven to Westfield, where he took the western train, saying he was on his way to the old country. He was identified by the hotel clerk and the driver from a photograph shown them by Detective Ring. McNeally—if that was the stranger's name—had a large amount of money sewn into his coat lining, and those who saw him say, carried a roll of bills as large as a man's leg. Most of the bills were those of the Merchant's Bank of Halifax. He offered to buy a couch and a pair of Mr. J. B. Thomson's—St. John Telegraph.

A RAILWAY SMASH UP.—A big smash up occurred at Irishtown crossing, near Moncton, on Saturday night last. The drawbar between two 20-ton coal gondolas of a special from Springhill, broke, and three gondolas and three box cars went off the track. The gondolas were smashed to kindling wood, the coal was scattered about and the track torn up. The express trains were delayed till five o'clock on Sunday morning. The men worked all day and the track was cleared on Sunday evening about dark. No persons were injured.

THE SHOOTING SEASON.—The season has arrived when the small boy borrows a gun or revolver and hies himself off to the wood in search of game. That he sometimes hits something is evidenced by the case of a young Halifax lad named Malone, who went out shooting on Saturday last, and returned to the city later on with the side of his face torn off. The story he tells is that he was carrying the gun by the barrel, the butt trailing, when the trigger caught and the charge exploded with the result above mentioned. We trust that parents will keep a sharp look out after their boys, and be very chary about allowing them to carry firearms.

THE FIRE RECORD.—Says the Summerside Pioneer:—"Some malicious person on Wednesday night tried to set fire to D. Stewart's store. At the back door a box of coal was setting about a foot or so from the building. The wall of the building, the side of the box next to the wall, and the coal in the box had been saturated with oil, and some paper and extinguished matches were found in the box the next morning. There is little doubt but that the guilty parties could be easily found. A barn belonging to Geo. Sutherland, at Bathurst, was a few days ago destroyed by fire with all its contents, including six cows, four horses, farming implements and the season's crop. Loss \$3,500. The Baptist Church at Bear River, N. S., took fire on Saturday afternoon and was with difficulty saved from destruction. The fire originated near the furnace.

The Summerside Races.

Rather a small number, probably a hundred and fifty, attended the races at Summerside driving park on Friday afternoon last. Though the day was fine, the track, owing to the rains and frosts of the previous five or six days, was heavy and "grassy," and not at all suitable for fast trotting. The judges were Messrs. J. O. Arsenault, Wellington, starter; J. B. Russ and Daniel Campbell, Summerside; W. A. Noonan, Summerside, timer. The first race called was for the three-year-olds, in which there were only two entries—Jas. McNeill's (Summerside) black mare Dinah, and Thomas Tuplin's (Indian River), brown mare Ethel Dean, both by Dean Swift. Dinah drew the pole, and won the first heat easily by about seventy-five yards, in 3:28. In the second heat she again led off. Ethel's driver pushed her, and at the half mile Dinah only led by one length. This lead, however, she increased to 81 or eight lengths at the finish. Time, 3:21. The third heat was merely a repetition of the two previous ones, Dinah coming in an easy winner by about eighty yards in 3:20. Summary:—

The next race was the three minute class, the entries being Geo. Muttart's (Summerside) Donald, by All Right, and Geo. B. Sims' (Kensington) Whistler. Donald drew first position, and they got away at the fourth score. Whistler led nearly all the first round, and at the half they were pretty well abreast. At the second turn Whistler broke badly, and Donald passed him and held his lead, coming in about twenty-five yards ahead in 3:08. In the second heat they started on the first score. Whistler broke at the quarter, but gained considerably on the home stretch. Donald led by two lengths at the half, which he held till near the last turn, from which it was neck and neck to the wire. Donald winning by half a length in 3:03. Summary:—

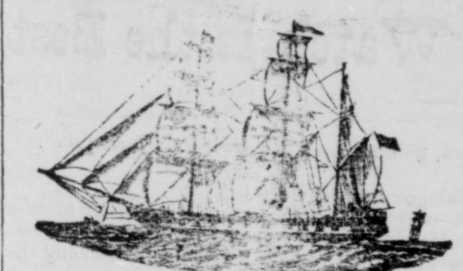
