Export of Apples.

OTTAWA, June 4.

In the House of Commons Hon. Mr. Patterson introduced a bill to dispense with the revision of voters' lists for 1892, and to legalize certain lists which were not returned within the prescribed time. The bill was read a second time.

In answer to Mr. Mills, of Annapolis, Hon. Mr. Costigan said that the Government was aware that apples are being exported from Canada in barrels of different sizes, and not in compliance with Section 18 of the Weights and Measures Act, to the injury of certain portions of the Dominion, the apple trade of which complies with the Act. The present law forbids apples being exported except in certain barrels. It is the intention to put the apples in a schedule of articles subject to inspection, and it will be the duty of inspectors to see that barrels are in accordance with the Act.

An Unsatisfactory Appointment.

ST. JOHN, June 4.

The deadlock over the appointment by the Provincial Government of a Judge of Probate for St. John, was broken yesterday by the appointment of C. N. Skinner, M. P. It appears that Mr. Skinner may hold the position and sit in Parliament. The appointment disposes of the stalemate of St. John, all of whom supported the Blair Government, while all are political opponents of Mr. Skinner.

Protectors of the Fisheries.

HALIFAX, June 4.

The steam fishery cruiser Acadia sailed yesterday afternoon for the fishing grounds under the command of Lieut. O. G. V. Spau, R. N. The new cruiser Kingfisher, Capt. Kent, also left yesterday.

The French gunboat Hussar arrived here yesterday afternoon from Martinique. She carries four guns. The Hussar will remain here for about ten days, after which she proceeds to Sydney.

Militia Changes.

OTTAWA, June 4.

No. 12 military district, Prince Edward Island, will hereafter be incorporated in and form part of No. 8 military district. The Prince Edward Island brigade of Garrison Artillery at Charlottetown and Engineers Company and 82nd Battalion are transferred to No. 8 district. Col. Walsh, of the 63rd, retires.

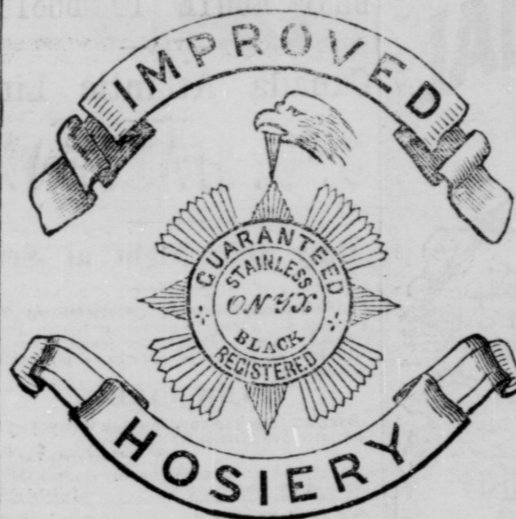
