**WE AND OUR NEIGHBORS**

**SEPARATE BUT NOT LONELY.**

Mr. White often disagrees with me but of late week's column he said, "It is true we all live in separate worlds — and that's what makes life so lonely."

I told him that wasn't at all what I meant. Life needn't be lonely. Among other desires, each of us wants companionship, approval, achievement, but different native endowments, rearing and environment have given us special outlooks on life in our struggle to realize these desires. Sympathy and a willingness to help allow us to enter the world of our neighbor.

Every hospital, it is true, is a world apart. But the doctors, the nurses, the therapist, every attendant and every visitor who brings kindness and help breaks into that little world and at the same time loses something of his own separateness.

Not only hospitals but institutions of all kinds — orphanages, jails, etc., are extreme examples of separate worlds in our midst, but we know there are also barriers between group and group, individual and individual on the outside. It isn't necessary, or perhaps even advisable, to try and break down all the barriers, but there are meeting grounds a plenty between those for example, of different religions, races or origins.

A sad instance of loneliness that isn't necessary, is that of the old. I received a letter from an old friend — he told me he was almost eighty-four. "Until recently," he said, "I was able to get about, but now I am pretty well confined to the house. How grateful I am to those who spare a few minutes for a chat with me once in a while!" He has lived in the same small town all his life — and probably his father and grand-father before him. His loneliness and separateness vanishes when a visitor arrives — and so does that of the visitor himself.

Perhaps more effort and kindness between members of the same family living under the same roof, each with his own special attitudes, than in any other relationship. It is far simpler to make an elderly neighbour happy with a few minutes' chat than to keep parents and contented. It is easier to make gestures of friendship toward a neighbor raised in an entirely different environment, than to accept one's own teen-ager's tastes and activities.

The meeting opened with a worship service conducted by Arlene Lyster. The theme was: "Behold, I Send You Forth — to Serve". The scripture reading was taken from 1 John 14:1-13. Hymns sung were: "I love To Tell The Story" and "O Master, Let Me Walk With Thee." The Lord's Prayer closed the devotional period.

During the business period plans were made to attend the special services on Friday night after a lively sing song, the meeting closed by the singing of Taps.

And what exercise of the imagination is often needed for husband and wife to approach each other's unique world! Of different sex, sometimes of utterly different backgrounds, husband and wife can, and too often, do, go separate and lonely ways while living in the same house. Sympathy, kindness, the willingness to further each other's goals — work here, to, to break down barriers. But there will probably always be that only our great novelists and poets, that only a Shakespeare can fully enter into another's world — but trying, helps.
