Falconwood Farm showed a deficit of \$12,160 on the year's operations, a department of agriculture report tabled in the legislature Wednesday indicates. Expenses of \$48,066, including \$10,724 for labor and \$15,311 for mill feeds, minerals, crusting and mixing—straw and shavings cost \$1,015—compared with total receipts of \$64,996. The receipts included \$14,133 for milk used at Riverside Hotel, \$6,714 for milk sold to Beach Grove Hospital, \$3,900 for milk to provincial home for aged, \$3,147 for 129 bags sold to Riverside Hospital and \$10,830 or potatoes sold to Riverside.

Goods sold to other institutions included \$694 for cattle and \$1,770 for swine.

Influenza Cases Said Not Serious

Prince Edward Island's current outbreak of influenza has not yet reached serious proportions, Dr. Burton Howatt, public health director, said yesterday. All sources reached by The Guardian-Patriot, including doctors, schools and hospitals indicate that locally the flu bug has been no more prevalent this year than the past few winters. Dr. Howatt said that as far as the department of health is concerned, the influenza outbreak is no worse than in past years. "In the first week of March," said the doctor, "10 cases of influenza were reported in Charlottetown compared with 40 for the same period last year." SAMPLES TO HALIFAX Samples of the influenza germs were sent to Halifax for examination to determine its type so as to discover how it may be better controlled. However, the P.E.I. Hospital, the Charlottetown Hospital, and the Prince County Hospital have restricted all but absolutely necessary visitors.

SAFEGUARD MEASURE "Restricting visitors is simply a safeguard measure," said Mr. MacLean. "We want our patients to have as little contact with people outside the hospital as possible." An early morning report had stated that the influenza situation at the Provincial Home for the Aged had reached a serious level, but the Home's Dr. Sweeney later stated "there are no cases at all, just a few colds." Supervisor of city schools, Dr. R.A. Parker, said there are no signs of the influenza becoming serious, at present. "Absenteeism has been greater than usual for the past two days at most city schools," Dr. Parker said, "but this may be because of the storm and its disruption of communication." Note that the city's eight schools was closed yesterday, and the fact that only seven of the city's 150 teachers are out because of the flu germ is a good indication that the local schools have not been dealt too severe a blow as yet.

Two schools had an average daily attendance of only three pupils, one in Birchville and one in June 30, 1962, the report reveals.
