CAC Plans Opposition To Trading Stamps Use

An executive meeting of the provincial branch of the Canadian Association of Consumers will be held soon to plan opposition to the use of trading stamps in Prince Edward Island.

This plan was announced following the inauguration by Holmans Limited of a premium plan at their Charlottetown and Summerside food stores.

Mrs. J.A. Lawson, Charlottetown, a national executive member of the C.A.C., said the association was in extreme opposition to the use of trading stamps and was putting up a desperate fight against their use.

"I cannot see there is anything wrong in it," Dominion stores announced yesterday that it will not use trading stamps in any of its Maritime outlets "in the foreseeable future."

Frank H. Sobey, president of the Sobey chain of Maritime food stores, announced his opposition earlier in the week. He said his stores can sell at prices two per cent less than stores using the stamps.

IGA was the first group of Maritime food stores to introduce the stamps, although a Steinberg market in New Brunswick had them earlier.

Warning Given Egg Producers

OTTAWA — Canadian egg producers were warned yesterday by Agricultural Stabilization Board that they will not be in line for deficiency payments that may be made unless they are officially registered.

A spokesman for the board said many egg grading stations across the country are reporting producers' marketings, but that many of the producers have no registration number and therefore cannot be included for participation in the federal price support program.

This program, which replaces the policy of direct purchases of eggs by the Board, went into effect Oct. 1.

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Albion Boy Has Leg Hurt

Dr. Todor Gencheff said last night that nine-year-old William Gionet of Albion South was resting fairly comfortably at the Charlottetown Hospital where he was taken yesterday following an accident that occurred near his home Thursday. Dr. Gencheff added that he expected the young lad would be permitted to return home in the next day or two.

A son of Mr. and Mrs. William Gionet, the young boy suffered a compound fracture of the leg Thursday when he was in collision with a car reportedly driven by Vincent Arsenault of Albion South.

He was transferred to Charlottetown following x-rays taken at the Western Hospital.

Barn Destroyed At Murray River
