Canadiens Held To 4-4 Tie By Lowly Black Hawks

ST. LOUIS (AP)—A rousing third-period rally that netted three goals carried the last-place Chicago Black Hawks to a 4-4 draw with the league-leading Montreal Canadiens here Tuesday night in St. Louis' first National League hockey game in 20 years.

While a crowd of 10,273 fans, adopting the Hawks as their "home team," cheered them on in the first of six C.N.L. games scheduled here this season, Dave Creighton, Bill Mosienko and Lou Jankowski drove home the goals that broke a four-game losing streak.

It was the third tie for the Hawks to go along with three victories in 19 games this season, and the young team showed that it might be ready for the way to victory. The Hawks trailed 3-1 after the first period which their two new players from New York, Allan Stanley and Nick Mickoski, missed because they didn't arrive on schedule.

Whether it was the help of the new comers or whether the swiftness of Frank Eddolls suddenly caught fire is open to debate. But the second period was even, without a score, and the Hawks had a 4-3 edge in the final stanza before Montreal's Boom Boom Geoffrion made it 4-4 with a slick goal in the final seven minutes. It was his

17th of the season. Chicago's first goal was scored by Metro Prystai, who later set up two others. Maurice Richard tallied a tying marker for his 10th goal of the season. Kenny Mosdell and then Jean Beliveau also tallied for Montreal in the first stanza to make it 3-1.

Well, the mix-up concerning the our games which the Islanders are scheduled to play in Moncton on Saturday night has been ironed out by the league at a meeting in the Fort Cumberland Hotel, Amherst, recently. The meeting was called because of a protest that the Islanders had issued to the league in regard to the undesired weekend contests and the necessity of making two road trips during the weeks that these matches are being played. It was the Moncton Hawks that requested the change in the schedule and it was easy to see that the whole affair was to benefit Bag and Co., at the expense of the local team.

So, when the Islanders sent the protest to the league office in the Hub City, Moncton followers were the first to hear about it and didn't like the thoughts of having their request rejected or that they might have to compensate the locals for their trip over. In fact, the adversity grew so intense that on one occasion the Islanders were referred to as a "bunch of dissenters" and their protest as "overstuffed." It is our guess that our neighbors across the water don't think that it was so over-stuffed after all, since the Islanders, with support from the other two league sides, were granted partial compensation for their week-end trips by the Moncton owners at the Amherst meeting.

Representing the Islanders at the Amherst parley were Forrest Clow, Gilbert Gauget and Walter Lawlor. Another thing that the Islanders requested and were granted was that the referee see all players' cards before each and every game. This will go into effect on December 5. The games which were scheduled for December 23, 24 and 25 have been cancelled and will be played at the end of the present schedule. The only time announced at the session was a \$5 one to Islanders' Wimpy Jones for his argument with a referee recently.

Presently the Islanders, under coach Steve Brklacich, are the terror of the other three clubs—running wild over the Caps and the Hawks recently. In four games they piled up a total of 32 goals with only 6 being scored against them. They beat the Hawks at the Charlottetown Curling Club last evening. Andrews-Maxim Bout Tonight

CHICAGO (AP)—Lanky, hard-punching Paul Andrews of Buffalo, N. Y., tabbed a "sleeper" threat to heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano, gets measured for class tonight against former light heavyweight champion Joey Maxim.

Maxim is a 7-5 favorite in the 10-round match to be televised nationally.

Andrews, 24, who has flattened 19 opponents in winning 29 of 32 starts, ranks third behind the No. 2 Maxim among contenders for Archie Moore's light-heavy crown. Marciano and his manager, Al Weill, are reported interested enough in Andrews' potentialities as a heavyweight menace to view tonight's proceedings from ringside.

Andrews will weigh about 177 and Maxim approximately 182.

Boxing Promoter Fined \$1,000

NEW YORK (AP)—Tex Sullivan, matchmaker at St. Nicholas Arena, was fined \$1,000 Tuesday and ordered to return cheques of \$100 each to 19 boxers who "donated" that sum for the privilege of appearing on nationally televised shows.

Sullivan is a member of the New York Managers Guild which solicited the contributions from boxers in gratitude for increasing their payments from TV bouts.

Robert K. Christenberry, chairman of the New York state athletic commission, said that Sullivan's punishment would have been much more severe except for his previous good record. Sullivan will be suspended until the payments are made.

Esks Rooters Begin Arriving In Toronto

EDMONTON (CP)—Roughly 500 Edmonton Eskimo Supporters, proudly sporting their partisan green and gold, will cruise through downtown Toronto Saturday to scatter 84,000 reminders that they "Love Those Esks."

The first contingent of rooters arrive in Toronto Friday night, the second early Saturday morning. Between then and Saturday night, they'll do their utmost—with nearly 20,000—to spur the excitement of their club's second entry into the Grey Cup in three years, this time against favored Montreal Alouettes.

The outlay on heralding the western presence is expected to be the most made by any Western inter-provincial football union crowd.

In addition to the basic cost of \$20,000—footed by both the City of Edmonton and the football club—each Edmonton fan probably will spend better than \$200, even with a special package transportation deal.

IMITATION IGLOO

They'll start with a floor show Friday night in a downtown hotel where a big imitation igloo will be set up in the lobby as an information centre.

Ten floats and several miniature trains will be used in the parade the following morning.

The Eskimo rooters—complete with green-and-gold scarves, hats, gloves, buttons and banners—will then scatter 6,000 cotton "snowballs," and distribute 25,000 gally-wrapped ice-cream bars, 15,000 scarves bearing greetings from the City of Edmonton, 18,000 cardboard cutouts of an Eskimo player, 20,000 pamphlets comically depicting how Eskimos made the grade, and hundreds of football-shaped balloons.

Inscribed on just about everything will be "Love Those Esks."

BROOKLYN (AP)—Walter O'Malley, Brooklyn Dodgers president said Tuesday Walter Alton, manager for 1955 under a one-year contract.

He did not divulge the terms. It will be Alton's second year as Dodger manager. He was brought up from Brooklyn's Montreal farm club last season as successor to Chuck Dressen.

 MONTREAL (CP)—Montreal Alouettes' workout Tuesday on a snow-and-slush-covered field was so hush-hush that it became insignificant compared with the sudden stir over the Alouette tactic.

The only connection between these bits of news is that both are related to the Grey Cup football classic in Toronto next Saturday.

Coach Douglas (Peahack) Walker quietly marshalled his eastern champions behind closed and guarded doors and entrances at the Westmount Athletic Club grounds.

The goings-on there were so secret that not only was the public barred but so were newspaper men. And bandmen, too, for that matter, even if one had been Gabriel tooting his trumpet.

ONLY BAND IN STADIUM

The band blared into the news with the announcement that the smart red-and-white uniformed musicians will be on hand for the Grey Cup game and most likely the only band in Toronto's Varsity stadium. For those who find other attractions more eye-filling, there will be the eight Alouette majorities.

J. G. Carrique, chairman of the Alouette advisory board and the man who has been looking after the band's trip, found himself Tuesday with added duties.

"The Canadian Rugby Union has asked us to provide the pre-game and half-time musical entertainment," he said.

"From what I understand now we will have the only band in the stadium. There is the question of seating space. I believe there is some worry in Toronto also over whether union regulations will require a stand-by band, since we are an outside organization."

TEAM BAND

The Alouette football club is the only professional team in Canada with its own band. It is a 48-piece band, with a drum major, musical director and, of course, the prancing majorities.

The Alouette team worked out late in the day, the first practice since the Als defeated Hamilton Tiger-Cats Saturday in the Big Four playoff. Only a light drill was scheduled. There will be no heavy work between now and game time. The team will arrive in Toronto Thursday night by train.

Italian Wins Sports Car Div. of Road Race

JUAREZ, Mexico (AP)—Umberto Maglioli, speed-happy Italian driver, won the International sports car division of the Pan-American road race Tuesday in a thrilling finish, just four car lengths ahead of Phil Hill of Santa Monica, Calif.

Maglioli elapsed time in the 1,908 mile race which cost seven drivers' lives was a new record in 17 hours 40 minutes 26 seconds. Hill's second place time was 18 hours four minutes 54 seconds.

Juan Manuel Fangio of Argentina set the previous record of 18 hours 11 minutes last year in a Lancia. The course distance then was 1,912 miles.

Luis Chinetti and France Cornacchia, both of Italy, followed Hill in the big sports class, giving Ferraris a sweep of the first four places.

Hans Herman of Germany came from behind to win first money in the small sports class over Jaroslav Juhan. Both drove porcsches.

Louis Chiron of France, in an Oscar, was third. Fernando Suarez, Argentine, was fourth and Salvador Lopez Chavez of Mexico fifth in Porches.

Tommy Disdale of El Paso, driving a Dodge, won the final lap and first-prize money in the eight-lap race in the small stock car class.

C. D. Evans of El Paso, also driving a Dodge, finished second. Evans won the small stock car class last year.

Ray Elliott of Portland, Ore., finished third in a Dodge followed by Scott Yantle of El Paso in a yellow Studebaker. Arturo Alvarez Tostado of Mexico City was fifth in a Dodge.
